## Labour Force Statistics May 2005

## HIGHLIGHTS

All labour force statistics in this Highlights article are seasonally adjusted, unless otherwise indicated

- In May, BC's unemployment rate fell to 5.7 percent, the second lowest rate on record.
- Canada's unemployment rate remained unchanged over the month at 6.8 percent.
- BC's youth unemployment rate was down from 11.4 percent in April to 10.9 percent in May. This is its lowest level since August 1990.
- The unemployment rate for those 25 years and older declined from 5.1 percent in April to 4.7 percent in May.
- The number of unemployed declined by 7,300 workers due to a growth in employment opportunities.
- In May, the Province saw a net gain of 17,700 jobs, which is 4,400 more than last month's gain of 13,300 jobs.

- The labour force participation rate increased slightly from 65.6 percent in April to 65.7 percent in May.
- For May, there was a net decrease of 7,200 jobs in the Goods producing industries. The largest loss was experienced in construction (-7,000).
- Among Service producing industries, there was a gain of 24,900 jobs. Employment growth was strongest in Public Administration, Transport and Warehousing, and Trade.
- When comparing the number of employed with the size of the working age population, **B.C.'s employment rate increased over the month from 61.6 percent to 62.0 percent.** Meanwhile, Alberta continued to have the highest rate of employment among provinces at 70.2 percent.
