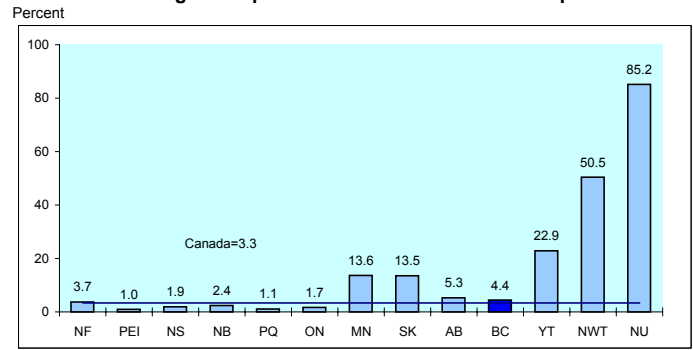

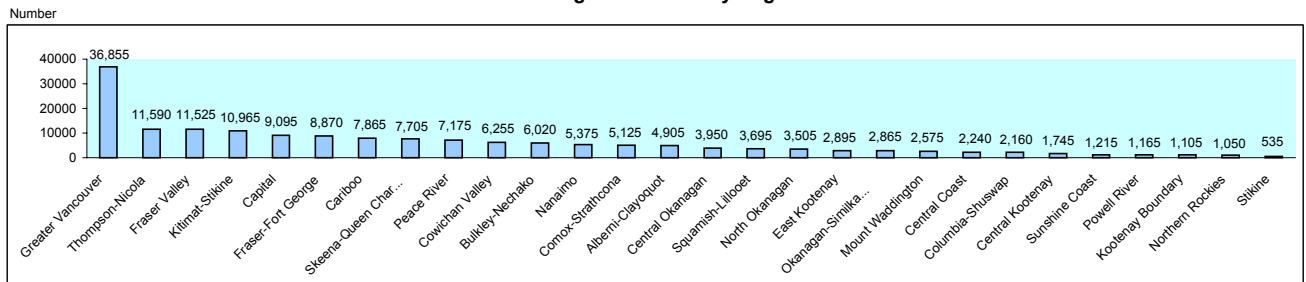

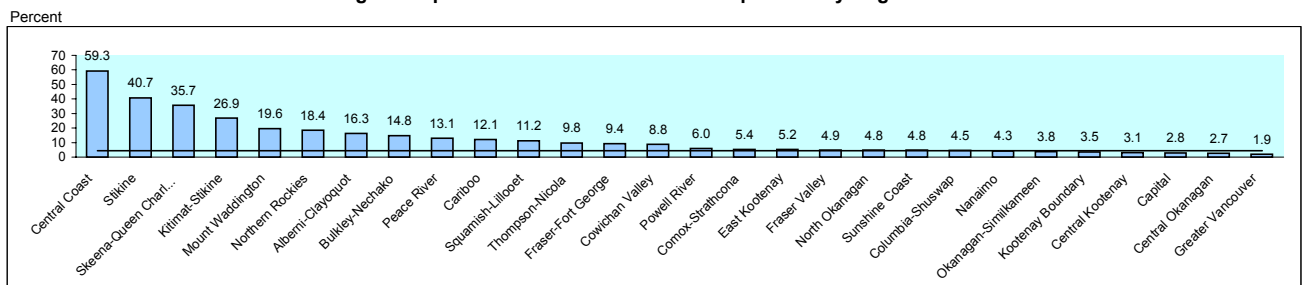


WHERE DOES THE BC'S ABORIGINAL POPULATION LIVE?

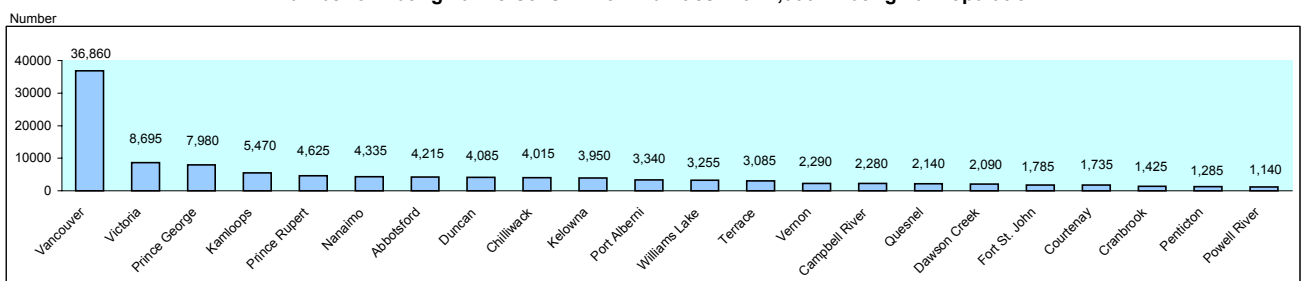
Number of Aboriginal Persons by Regional District



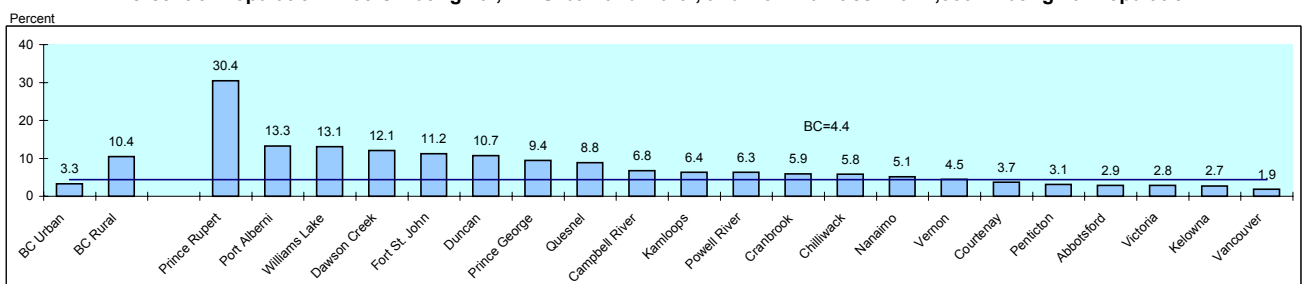
Aboriginal Population as a Percent of Total Population by Regional District

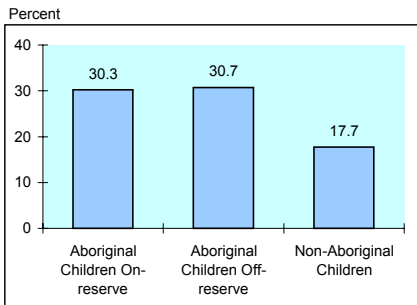

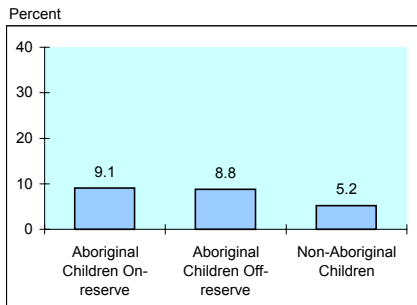

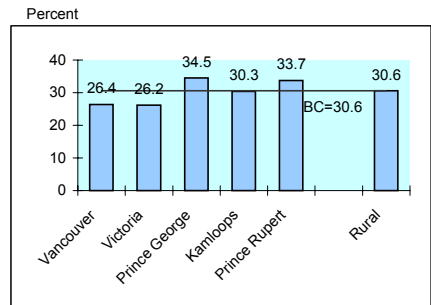
Children 0-14

As a Percent of Total Population

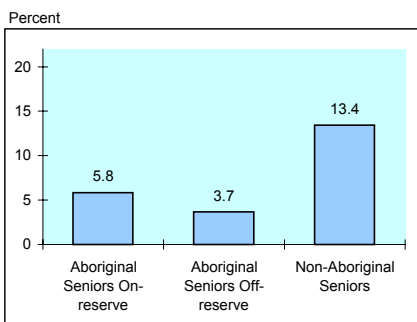


Aboriginal Children 0-14 as a % of Aboriginal Population in Larger Towns

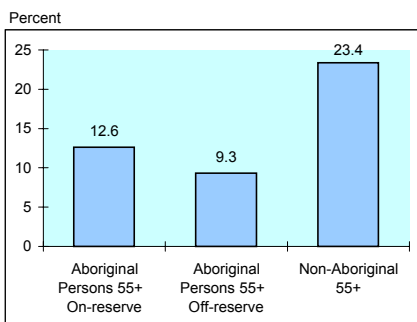

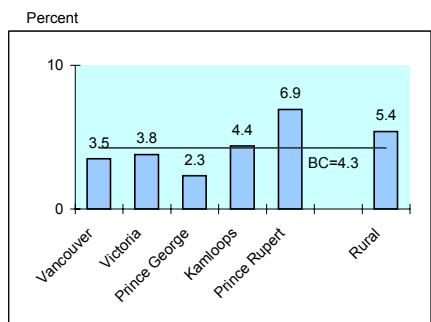
Seniors 65+

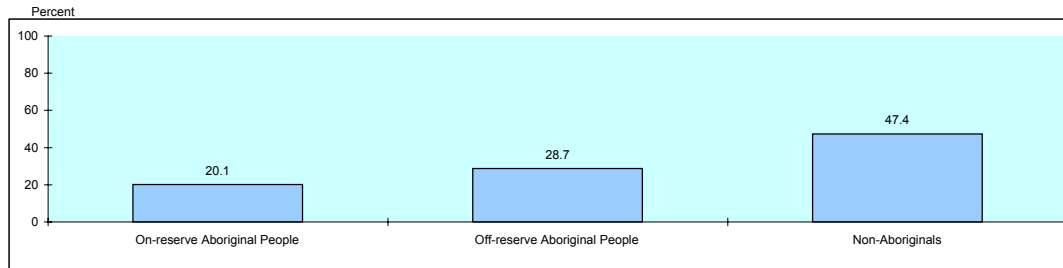

% of Population Age 25-64 with High School Graduation or Higher

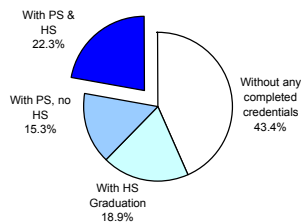


% of Population Age 25-64 with High School Graduation plus Post Secondary Completion

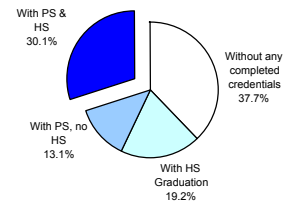

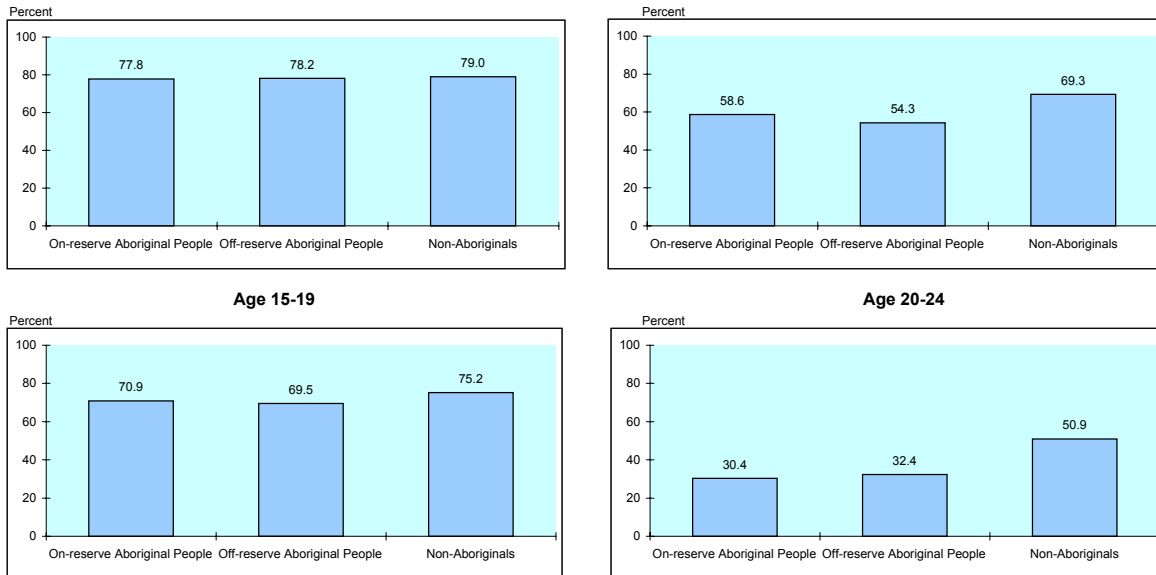

% of Population Who Attended School between September 2000 and May 2001

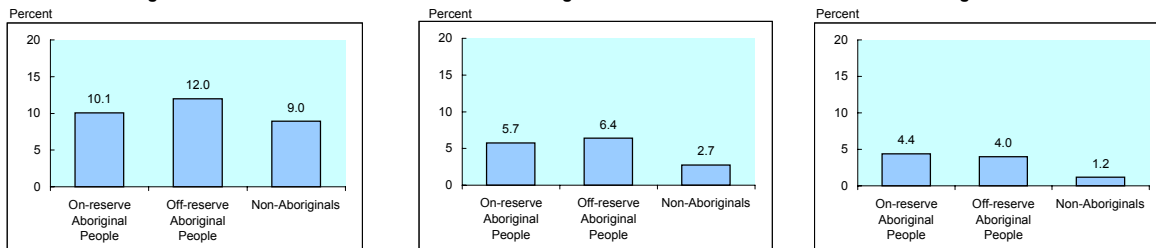

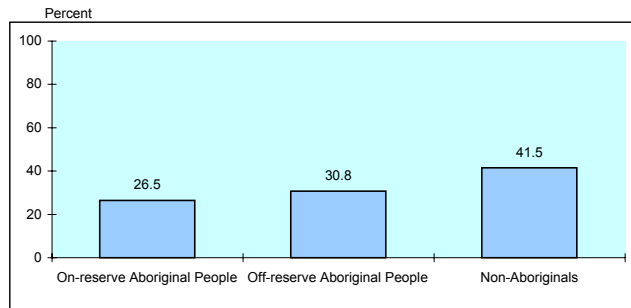

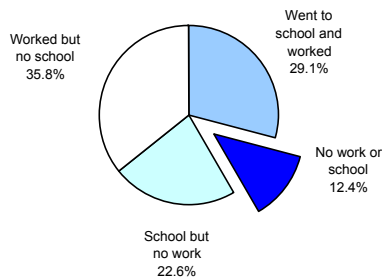
% of Population Age 15-24 Who Either Worked and/or Attended School between September 2000 and May 2001



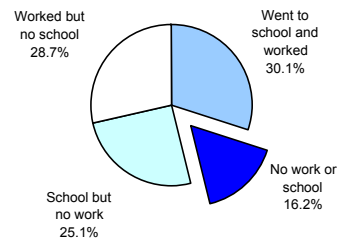
% of Population Age 15-24 Who Both Worked and Attended School between September 2000 and May 2001



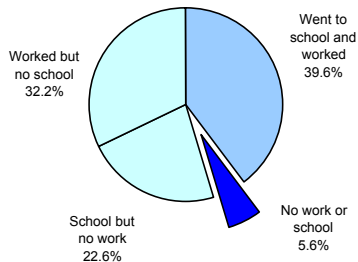
Aboriginal Male Population, Age 15-24



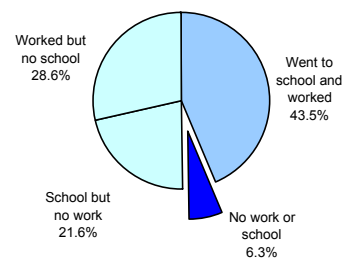
Aboriginal Female Population, Age 15-24

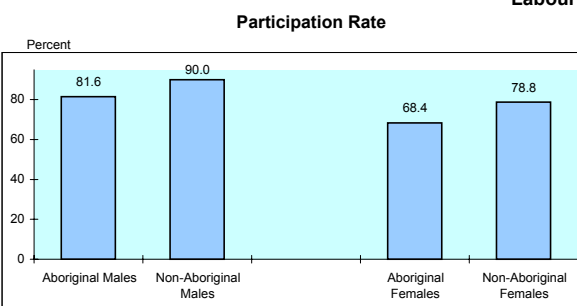

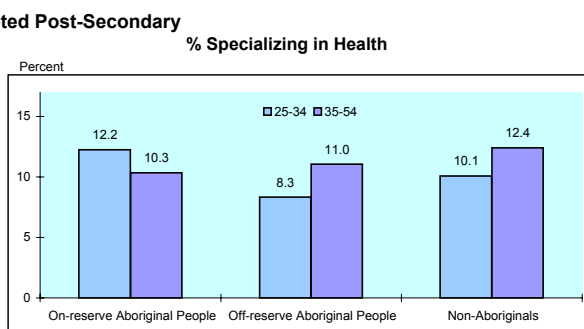

% of Population Who Worked in 2000



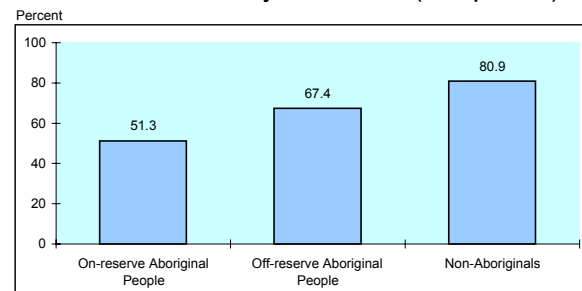
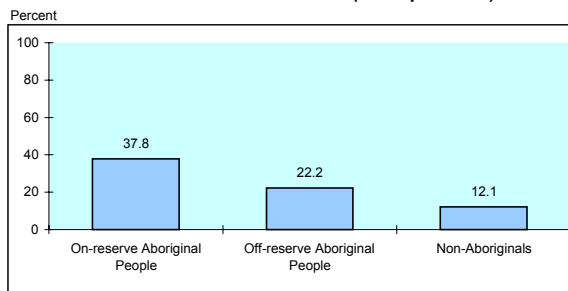
% of Population Who Worked 40+ Weeks Full-time in 2000

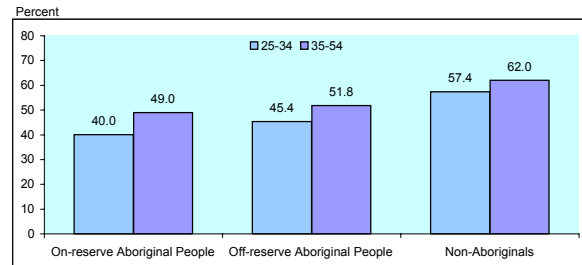
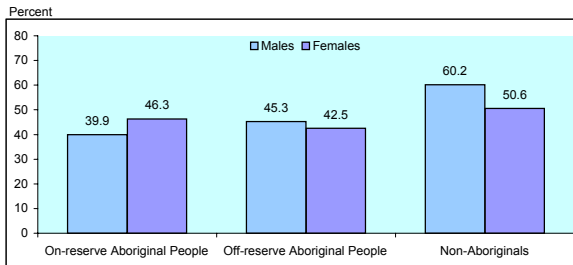

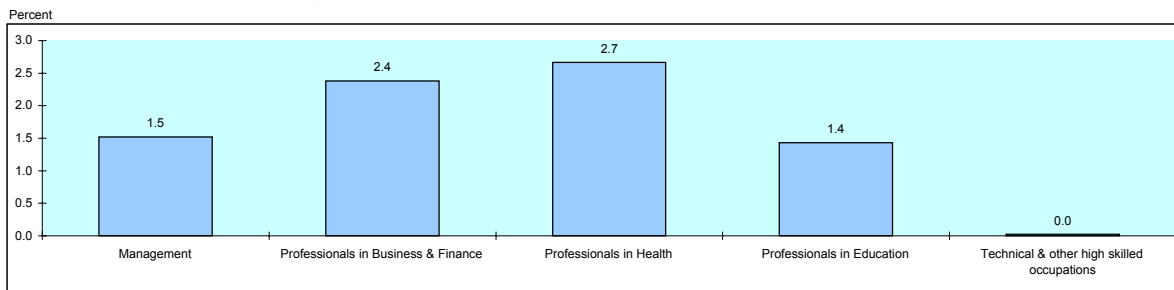
% of Experienced Labour Force in Management, Professional & Other High Skill Occupations

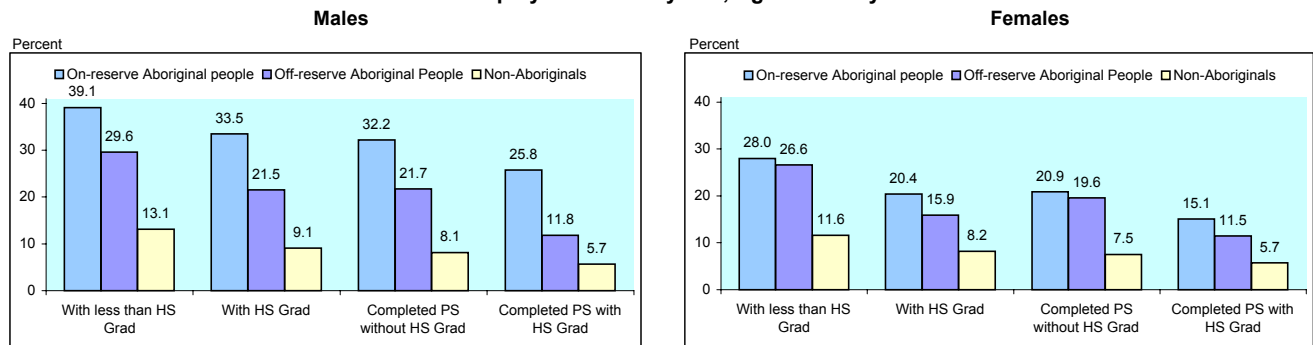

Unemployment Rate by Sex, Age 15+ - May 2001



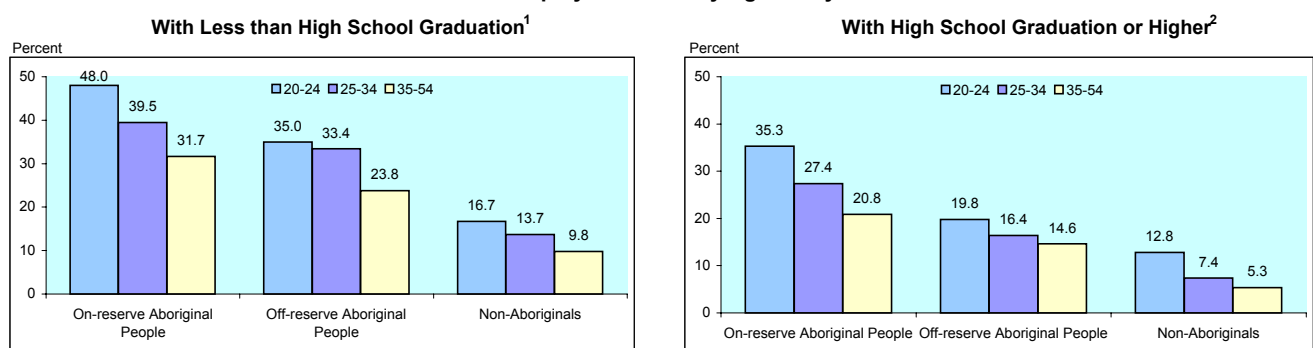

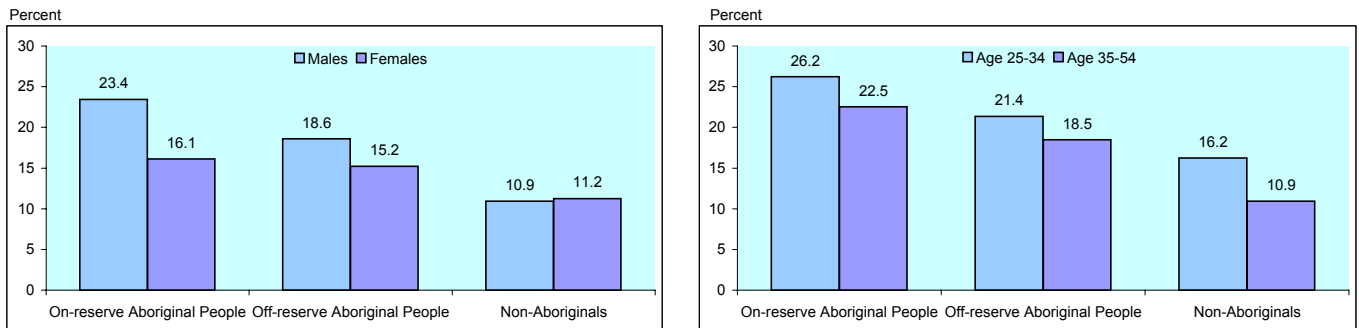

% of One-Family Households with Children under 15 by Major Source of Income



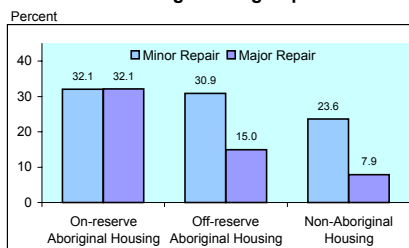
Percent Distribution of All Families by Income Level



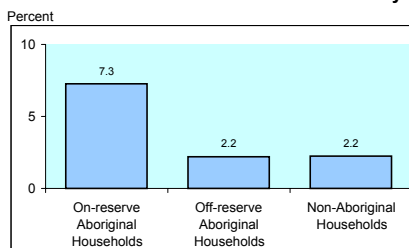

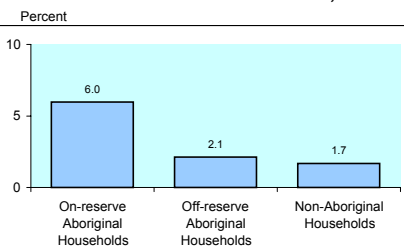
% of Housing Needing Repair 2001
