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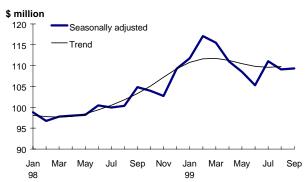
Tourism Room Revenue ◆ September 1999

Highlights

The Province

 Room revenue (seasonally adjusted) in BC edged up 0.2% to \$109.3 million in September.

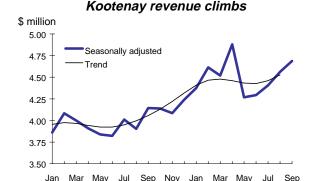
Room revenue flattens



- After peaking in February and followed by four months of decline, revenue appears to have stabilized.
- Other indicators for September present a mixed message in the tourism sector, with modest growth in some areas counterbalanced by slight declines in others.

In the Regions

• Revenue was up in five of the province's eight regions, led by a 6.6% jump in Cariboo. Kootenay is the only region to have shown sustained growth since May, and was up (+2.8%). Mainland/Southwest, the biggest region with over half of BC's revenue, saw revenue drop for the second straight month (-1.1%).



The Accommodation Types

In September, room revenue rose for all accommodation types—with one notable exception. The large hotels (+250 rooms) posted a revenue decline for the second straight month (-6.3%) and the sixth time in the past seven months.

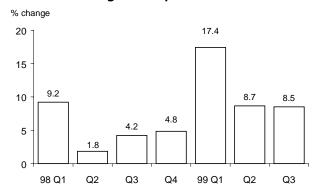


Room Revenue Trends (Unadjusted)

September room revenue (unadjusted for seasonal variation) was \$145.1 million, an increase of 4.3% over September 1998.

Through three quarters of the year, room revenue increased 10.6% over the same period of 1998, to \$1.1 billion.

Revenue growth improves over 1998



During the third quarter of 1999, revenue growth was at roughly the same rate (+8.5%) as in the second quarter. While this was slower than the first quarter of the year, it was double the rate of growth posted in the third quarter of 1998. Much of the third quarter growth occurred in July, and August and September experienced a slowdown in revenue growth.

Other indicators point to slow month

Other indicators also point to a cooling off in the tourism sector's growth. Some indicators, notably visitor entries from other countries, suggest the slowdown will continue into October.

In the hotel accommodation industry, average room rates fell for the first time since October 1998, sliding 2.4% to \$100. Occupancy rates dipped for the third straight month, down 3.4 percentage points, perhaps reflecting both a drop in demand and an increase in the available supply of rooms in the province.

There were 29,800 people working in the accommodation services industry in September, down 11.8% from September 1998. Employment in the industry peaked in 1996, and has been declining steadily since April 1997.

The number of US travellers (unadjusted) entering Canada via BC decreased 1.2%, but overseas entries gained 9.5% from September 1998. These trends continued into October.

On a year-over-year basis, air passenger volume through Vancouver International Airport was up 1.9% to 1.4 million. Victoria International Airport saw a downturn in passenger volume for the fourth straight month (-6.3%), marking the first downward trend since March 1995. Ferry passenger traffic also slipped, with 0.3% fewer passengers travelling on the BC Ferry system.

Traveller Entries to BC (seasonally adjusted): October

International visitor entries

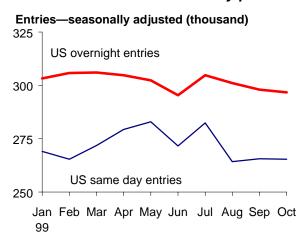
In October there were 678,000 international entries to BC (seasonally adjusted), down 0.6% from September.

US entries continued down...

October saw the third straight drop in the number of US entries to BC. There were 560,100 US entries (seasonally adjusted), down slightly (-0.9%) from September. July represented a historic high in the number of visitors from the US, with 592,200 Americans entering BC, surpassing April's level of 582,900.

Overnight entries from the US were down for the third consecutive month, slipping 0.4% to 296,800. This was the sixth time in the seven months beginning with April that overnight entries have fallen.

...while overseas entries continued up

Total overseas entries were up a modest 0.6% to 117,800 in October, the second straight monthly increase. A gain of 1.8% from Asia was enough to offset declines from Europe (-3.0%) and Oceania¹ (-19.6%).

While overall Asian entries were up in October, this wasn't the case for all the countries in the region. Japan (+18.1%) and South Korea (+12.1%) both posted their second straight double-digit increase. while Taiwan (-10.6%) saw entries decline for the third time in the previous four months.

Asian entries have been volatile from month to month but have flattened since early in 1999.

More Canadians travelling overseas

There were 813,000 Canadian resident reentries to Canada via BC in October, down 1.7% from September. While travel to the US was down, the number of Canadians returning home via BC from countries other than the US rose for the third straight month (+1.4%).
