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
2001 Census Fast Facts: *BC Aboriginal Identity Population – Income and Low Income*

Income

Employment is the main source of income for both Aboriginals¹ and non-Aboriginals, with both groups receiving about 75 per cent of their total income from employment. Government transfer payments make up 20.6 per cent of Aboriginal total income, compared to 11.5 per cent among non-Aboriginals.

Non-Aboriginals were more likely to work full-year/full-time (33.4%), compared to Aboriginals (22.0%). Among those who worked full-year/full-time, average employment income for Aboriginals was considerably lower at \$34,696 compared to non-Aboriginals at \$44,552.

Comparisons within total income groups show the Aboriginal population concentrated at the low end, with 63.8 per cent making less than \$20,000, compared to non-Aboriginals at 45.3 per cent. The total median income² of Aboriginals is \$13,242, compared to \$22,535 for non-Aboriginals.




¹ Based on Aboriginal identity. The Aboriginal identity population is made up of those persons who reported identifying with at least one Aboriginal group (North American Indian, Métis, Inuit), and/or who reported being a Treaty Indian or a Registered Indian (as defined by the Indian Act of Canada), and/or who were members of an Indian Band or First Nation.

² Dollar amount that marks the mid-point, i.e. one half of individuals have higher income than the median and the other half have lower income than the median.

Low Income Status of Off-Reserve Aboriginal Households

More than a third (35.1%) of off-reserve Aboriginal households were low income³ compared to a fifth (20.5%) of non-Aboriginal households. Households considered low income are those that, compared to the average household, spend 20 per cent more of their total income on food, shelter and clothing.



³ Low income households are households with at least one economic family living below the low income cut-off for economic family households, or at least one person in low income for non-economic family households. Economic families and unattached individuals living on Indian reserves were excluded in the low income/non-low income statistics. Therefore, the numbers reflect only the off-reserve population.
