## Notes

Population - effective for 1991 \& 1996 Census, nonpermanent residents included in total population. 1991 Census population - based on 1996 boundaries.
Family - refers to two or more persons living in the same dwelling, related to each other by blood, marriage, common-law or adoption.

Experienced labour force - includes persons who worked since Jan 1, 1995 and who were employed or unemployed during the reference week.
Non-movers - on Census Day were living at the same address as one or five years previous. Non-migrant movers - lived at a ditterent address but in the same census subdivision (CSD).
Average - or arithmetic mean is calculated by dividing the sum of included categories by the number of included categories.
Median - an alternate measure of 'averageness' Median income of a specific group is that amount which divides their income size distribution into two halves (below and above the median). Incidence of low income - the percentage of a specific group below Statistics Canada's low income cut-offs (LICO).
