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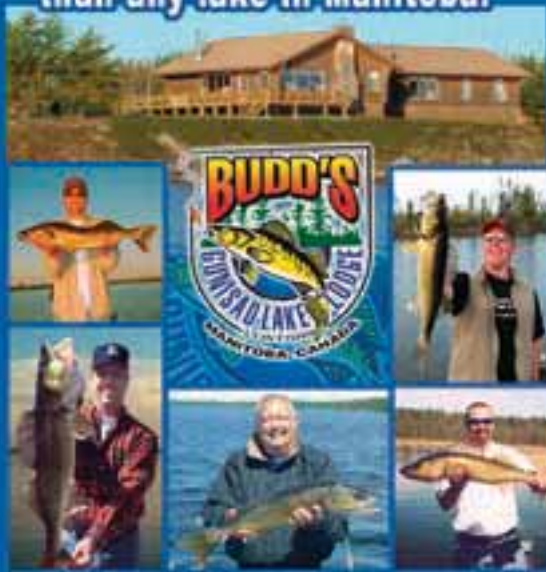
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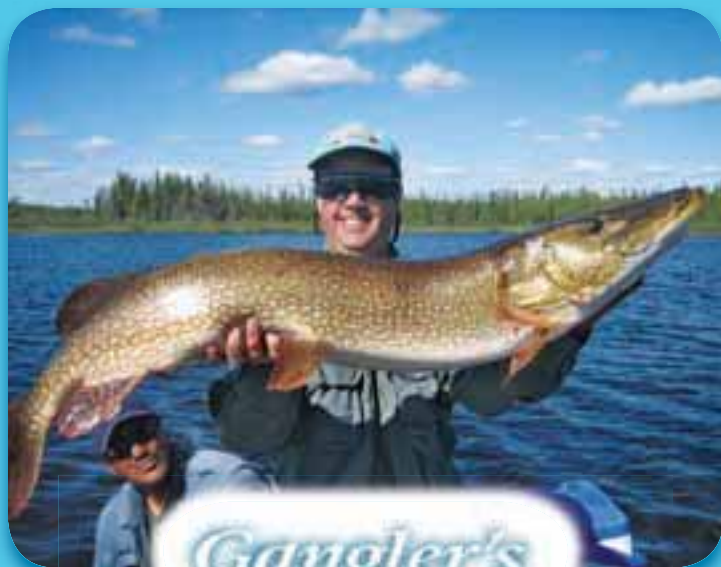
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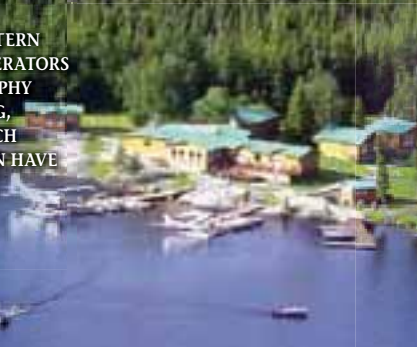
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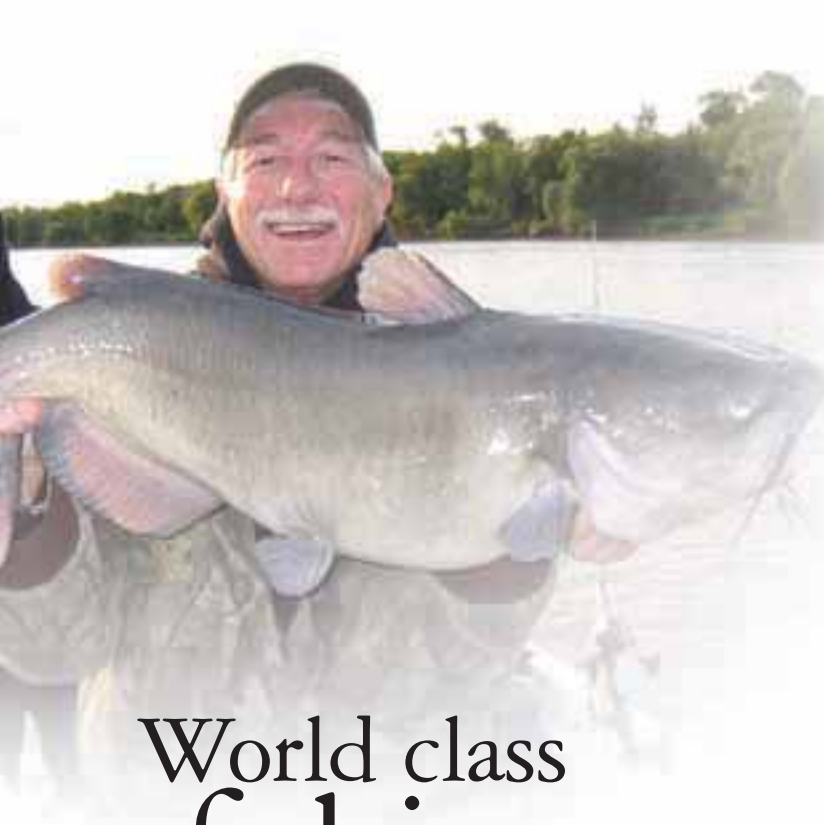
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KNOW BEFORE YOU GO

Traveling to Canada and crossing our borders need not be difficult. However, laws change on both sides of the border so it is imperative that you have all the needed information available to you. There are a number of web sites that offer excellent information and can keep you up to date with changing regulations.

Anyone convicted of any felony or misdemeanour may require a permit to enter into Canada. The type of offence as well as the amount of time passed since the offence occurred may affect the type of permit required. Applications for some permits may take between six weeks or up to eight months to process. If you require assistance, please contact Lucy Perillo. There have been a number of changes in the new border initiatives recently enacted by the United States. As of January 23, 2007 all air travelers entering the United States, regardless of citizenship, require a passport. As of January 31, 2008, United States and Canadian citizens will need to present either a WHTI-compliant document, or a government-issued photo ID, such as a driver's license, plus proof of citizenship, such as a birth certificate. This will be needed for land and sea travel.

At a later date in 2008, to be announced, the departments will implement the full requirements of the land and sea phase of the Western Hemisphere Travel Initiative. The proposed rules require all those entering the United States by any means, air, land or sea, to have either a passport or a trusted traveler card such as NEXUS, FAST, or SENTRI.
