

TLICHO CONSULTATIONS

To extend the length of the Tlicho winter roads season, DoT is considering possible routes for a new overland winter road

alignment. The new alignment would be routed around water and wetlands, and would have the potential to be made into an all-weather road in the future. It is expected that construction



and operation of a winter road over land would extend the winter road season from the current two to three month operating season to a three to four month season.

Consultations in the Tlicho communities provide the opportunity for the public to comment on the different routes and any environmental, social, cultural or economic concerns they may have. Consultations have occurred in Whati, Gameti, and Behchoko, and a consultation in Wekweeti and Yellowknife is planned for the end of April.

CO-OP PROGRAM

This past winter, the Department of Transportation hired two co-op students. In a co-op program, students take a semester of school, and work to gain valuable experience in their field.

Co-op students are expected to work under professionals in their field of study doing tasks that relate to what they are learning in school. During this time, the students foster and cultivate their professional social skills and apply learned classroom techniques in the real world.

scholarship program for
full-time post-secondary
students pursuing an



aviation-related career. Any training related to an aviation career such as flight attendant, aircraft maintenance engineer, pilot, or avionics technician is eligible for the \$5,000 scholarship. WIRELESS INTERNET IN INUVIK AIRPORT


