- advanced and extensive electronic connectivity, including over 75,000 strand kilometres of fibre-optic cabling and a high-speed, high-density broadband infrastructure


- a solid and extensive network of research and development facilities, supporting innovation and technology diffusion

OUTSTANDING ECONOMIC PERFORMANCE

Manitoba's \$37 billion economy is based on a rich mix of robust enterprises. No single industry dominates the economic landscape - rather, the provincial economy has many strengths, and Manitoba continues to broaden its economic base with exciting new investments.

Service industries account for 74 per cent of the GDP, lending stability to the economy. These industries tend to be less susceptible to fluctuations in the business cycle.

Manitoba is building a reputation as an excellent location for film and television production resulting in a burgeoning industry. Manitoba has also established itself as a financial services centre. Canada's largest mutual fund company and largest insurance company are both headquartered here.

Manufacturing is the province's largest industry, producing a wide variety of goods for markets across Canada and around the world. Aerospace equipment, processed foods, electronics, chemicals, urban and intercity buses, and furniture are among Manitoba's major manufactured goods exports.

Manitoba's primary industries include a large and long-established minerals sector, a highly diversified and modern \$3.8 billion agriculture industry, and a rapidly-growing and highly competitive hydroelectric energy sector.

BUILDING FOR THE FUTURE: FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

Manitoba's 2006 Budget charts a sound and sustainable financial course: Strategic forward-looking investments, more new tax reductions and continued progress in reducing debt and debt costs.

Budget 2006 projects a positive balance of \$3 million under balanced budget legislation. For the seventh straight year, the Province has committed to paying down the debt and pension liability, with a budgeted payment of \$110 million this year.

Continued improvement in the Province's financial position has given Manitoba one of Canada's highest quality provincial credit rankings. Manitoba's net general debt, at 14.9 per cent of GDP, is at its lowest level in over twenty years. Manitoba's public debt cost relative to revenue is, at 3.3 per cent, one of the lowest in Canada.

This year's budget continues to significantly reduce taxes for both individuals and corporations. Tax reductions in the last seven budgets have reduced the income tax burden for the average family by 20 per cent. Budget 2006 announced further cuts to income taxes for both large and small businesses.

Over the past several years, the government has taken important steps to increase transparency and accountability in financial reporting. These include improved accounting practices for capital acquisitions and the presentation of annual budgets for the entire government entity. Budget 2006 re-affirms the government's commitment to continually improve its financial reporting methods.

Manitoba's medium-term fiscal framework projects a balanced budgetary position into the future, continuing debt repayment and controlling the pension liability.



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
