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IS THIS YOU?

For First Time Distance Students

You must have a library account and PIN in order to access the many electronic journals and indexes available through Memorial University Libraries. To create your account and get a PIN, please contact your branch library - or, if you are a <u>DistancePlus user</u>, please complete the <u>online request form</u> (select DistancePlus QEII or DistancePlus Health as your library).

Please note that depending on the number of requests, it may take up to 3 business days for your User ID and PIN to be issued.

DistancePlus on your Desktop!

Need an article that's not in a Memorial e-journal? No time to wait for DistancePlus requests to arrive by "snail mail"? The solution is here - we are pleased to announce desktop document delivery of all photocopied materials!

Now when you order an item (e.g. journal article, book chapter, conference paper) via DistancePlus, it will delivered to you in an email containing a PDF link. The document can be printed or saved to your desktop.

Please note:

- The PDF link can be used only once, so be sure to print or save when you receive it!
- _ To ensure delivery, you should provide the library with your MUN email address (available via my.mun.ca)
- You will have to tick the copyright statement consent box in order to submit your request
- To place a request, log on to our online form, or click the document delivery link on the

Coming Soon: u-pick@mun.ca!

Memorial has improved the look and value of its e-mail service, and as a MUN student, you will soon be required to have official Memorial e-mail addresses. This is part of a new university policy requiring all official e-mail correspondence with students to be via u-pick@mun.ca addresses. As with other departments, the library increasingly relies on e-mail for contact and delivery of documents. A variety of problems, including non-delivery, happen when using non-Memorial accounts. Starting in spring 2008, the library will require you to have your "official" email account.

Memorial's new u-pick account offers:

- A choice of "nice" addresses based on your name
- Multiple ways to access •

Library research made easier: Explore a Topic

Memorial University Libraries has developed a great new tool, designed to help you with your research assignments by grouping together useful resources in your subject area. A link to Explore a Topic can be found in the Quick Search menu on the left side of most library web pages. On the Explore page for your subject you might find a chat box for live help from a

librarian, links to access reserves for your courses, tools to help you cite and develop bibliographies, and much more. There is a feature that allows searching across multiple article indexes, guides to various library resources, and links to important websites in you subject area.

Need Help? Just Ask a Librarian!

Learning with the Library Research Essentials Tutorial

Wondering what that Library thing is at the top of your Courses Widget in D2L? The Library Research Essentials (LRE) is a D2L-based tutorial, designed to teach you fundamentals of doing library research. You will learn the "essential" principles of effective searching and how to apply them to finding books and articles, all in an interactive and self-paced environment.

Each module takes about 30 minutes to complete, and contains interactive exercises, self-tests, and a graded final quiz. Although it is usually optional, your professor might recommend or even require that you do the LRE. But even if it is not required, give it a try! Whether you are new to library research or just need to brush up on your skills, the LRE can help.

Organize and Cite with Refworks

Refworks is a tool that makes it easier to organize and cite the sources you use in your research assignments. Organize your references quickly and easily by importing them into your own customized, searchable database. Then, use RefWorks when you are writing to automatically insert citations* and generate a bibliography in APA, MLA, or other citation style!

- Visit the library's <u>RefWorks page</u> to set up your account.
- To get up to speed and start using RefWorks today, check out the quick and convenient <u>on-line tutorials</u>.

*Please note that you will need to download <u>Write-N-Cite</u>, a free plug-in, to automatically generate references using MS Word.

Getting a Photo ID – at a Distance

Did you know that you can order a <u>MUN photo ID</u> from a distance, by completing the Campus Card Request feature on <u>my.mun.ca</u> and uploading your own photo? The Campus Card is useful if you are planning to visit a Memorial Library in person, because it functions as your library card, photocopy card, and printing card all rolled into one.
