History hunters Giving new life to province's past

rchivists at Memorial have formed a new group

Ato help promote some of the hidden treasures from Newfoundland and Labrador's past that are housed at the university.

From stunning resettlement photos and early snapshots of this province's towns and outports, to crew lists from countless ships that docked here, as well as personal letters, political papers, extensive collections of Newfoundland and Labrador folksongs and music, and documents from leading medical leaders - there are literally thousands of one-of-a-kind items available at employees' fingertips.

Now, the new organization is hoping to encourage more staff and faculty to visit their facilities and discover for themselves the fascinating bits of history tucked away on the St. John's campus.

Archivists@MUN was established this spring in an attempt to also raise awareness amongst the university community of the important work the employees have been doing for years. The group is made up of representatives from the MUN Folklore and Language Archive, located on the fourth floor of the Education Building; the Maritime History Archive (MHA), which is housed in the basement of the Henrietta Harvey Building; the Archives and Manuscripts Division in the Queen Elizabeth II Library; and the Faculty of Medicine Founders' Archive, located in the Health Sciences Centre. Dr. Melvin Baker, archivist/historian with the Office of the President, is also part of the new group.

"We want to increase our profile and let people know about our holdings," said Heather Wareham, an archivist with the MHA who has worked at Memorial for 29 years. "Personally, I don't think many employees realize the sheer volume of history we have. There may be items from their own family tucked away here."

"We can help individuals doing a wide variety of research, like family histories or genealogies, or looking for wartime letters or recitations or songs by somebody from their hometown that was recorded decades ago," added Linda White, who has worked with the Archives and Manuscripts Division for 16 years. "We do a lot of outreach work with people from around the world."

Each centre offers personal one-on-one reference time with an archivist.

"An alarming number of people don't know we exist and we want to change that perception," said Amanda Jamieson, an employee with the Archives and Manuscripts Division since 2005. "Our hope is to increase our profile and let people know what we're doing."

In addition, the group is also hoping to promote the importance of professional archivists at the university and the one-of-a-kind documents they're preserving, all the while collaborating with each other to share work concerns and various archival procedures.

"Each of our facilities has been around for years," added Ms. White. "There has been an archival presence at Memorial since the late 1960s and now we just want to promote our work and make people aware of the fact we can each, in our own way, offer a snapshot of this province's past."

s a child growing up in Western Canada, Audrey and equally captivated by images of rugged coastal scenery. So, you can imagine how delighted she was when she moved to this province in 1960 and quickly realized she had lots of inspiration right on her doorstep.

Since retiring from Memorial's Centre for Newfoundland Studies as a library assistant in 2000, Audrey's

She's taken classes Stephenville artist Lloyd Pretty and has had two solo shows at Pollyanna Art and Antique Gallery in downtown St. John's. Her work has also been displayed at Spurrell Gallery in the capital city, and at Five Islands Gallery in Tors Cove. "I'm inspired by our province's landscape and scenery and rocks," she said. "I enjoy being able to paint and sketch. I'm able to get away from everyday life."

She's also been able to see the province quite a bit. Some of her favourite places she draws on for inspiration

as well as the Ferryland Lighthouse, and Gallow's Cove, a scenic area in Torbay.



here did 2006 go? Each night, when I answer my daughter's question: "How many more sleeps until Santa?" I am aware that 2006 is almost behind us. For me, 2006 was a year of authenticity as I learned that in order to contribute my best, I have to be the truest version of me possible.

The Department of Human Resources has had a number of successes over the past few months. We have entered a partnership with the School of Human Kinetics and Recreation to provide ergonomic assessments and follow-ups internally using university resources and expertise to benefit students and employees. The remaining staff collective agreements were concluded. The wellness fair and flu clinics were well received. An employment equity survey was conducted and the analysis has begun.

The Employee Benefits Committee has been working closely with our department to establish a new optional life insurance benefit to provide greater protection for spouses and dependent children. As with our current "employee only" optional life insurance, this new benefit will be fully paid by employees who are interested in acquiring additional coverage for their spouses and dependent children. Coverage on spouses will be available in

units of \$10,000 up to a maximum of \$200,000 and premiums will be determined based upon the spouse's age and whether they are a smoker or non-smoker. Coverage for dependent children will be a flat amount of \$10,000. Preparations are underway to introduce this new benefit and we expect to provide employees with individual information packages shortly.

Over the next few months we will be working on understanding the impact of changes to the Human Rights Code around age discrimination; pursuing initiatives arising out of the Katz Report, including the finalization and roll-out of a Respectful Workplace Policy; conducting an employee opinion survey; and we will be engaged in a review of our employment systems to identify and correct any systemic discrimination in our

The Department of Human Resources has taken steps to ensure that Memorial can achieve the people aspects of the strategic plan. We have recently hired two full-time learning and development officers. I would like to congratulate Lynn Best and Anne Marie O'Keefe-Penney on their appointments to these roles which

Anne Marie is immediately moving to a secondment as manager of Continuing Professional Development Programs with the Faculty of Medicine. Crunching the numbers

Phase two of four-step review underway

The numbers are in and officials from the Department of Human Resources are L currently taking a closer look at the make up of Memorial's workforce.

Earlier this fall, the first of a four-phase mandatory review of the university's employment equity program was completed, giving the department a better snapshot of who works at Memorial.

As a result of the equity questionnaire completed by employees in September 2006, Human Resources has employment equity data on almost 90 per cent of Memorial's workforce. According to the results, 4.23 per cent of employees selfidentified as visible minorities; 2.71 per cent said they were a person with a disability and 0.78 per cent said they were aboriginal, while 49 per cent of Memorial's workforce is female.

Amy Wyse, employment equity officer with the Department of Human Resources, said she's encouraged by the response rate. She said the questionnaire is important because it helps officials gauge the true composition of Memorial's workforce.

"This information will help the university determine whether or not Memorial's workforce properly reflects

Resources is now in the process of producing a detailed analysis of our workforce based on job classifications.

"This process ensures that the university will be in compliance with the Federal Contractors Program," Ms. Wyse added. "Compliance with this program allows the university to continue to receive contracts and research money from the federal government. It also ensures that the university is an equitable employer and that our workforce is diverse."

Employees will be asked to update and confirm their employment equity information periodically.

As well, the Employment Equity Committee began meeting on a regular basis in December 2006. That group is made up of representatives from the more than 500 Memorial employees who volunteered to participate in committees and focus groups in order to support the employment equity program.

"It's definitely encouraging that so many employees are willing to contribute," Ms.
