



Map 1. In this map, each dot represents a grizzly that was legally hunted in B.C. between 1977 and 2008. Red dots indicate a grizzly kill within a park or protected area. Pink dots represent kills that have occurred outside a park or protected area. If a pink dot is within a protected area (green shading), it represents a hunter kill that took place before the protected area was created.



Graph 1. This graph shows the top ten parks and protected areas in British Columbia where grizzlies have been legally killed by trophy hunters. The number of grizzlies shown represents the period from when the park was legally established up to 2008 (the most recent year for which we have data on the location of grizzly kills within park boundaries).



Graph 2. This graph shows the number of grizzly bears that were legally hunted in B.C. every year from 1977 (the year when government began to monitor the hunt) to 2009. A total of 9,484 grizzlies have been legally hunted in BC since 1977. Deaths due to trophy hunting represents 88% of the total known mortality due to human actions. On average, approximately 287 grizzlies are legally shot each year by trophy hunters in B.C.

The year 2001 in the graph is an outlier. It reflects a temporary moratorium that was established by the previous New Democratic Party government. This moratorium lasted only a few months long as the hunt was reinstated by the current Liberal Party government when they were elected to power in the same year.
