Centre Metropolis de la Colombie-Britannique

Established in 1996 as part of the national Metropolis Project and funded by the federal government, provincial government and the associated universities, MBC is located at Simon Fraser University and the University of British Columbia, with a Co-director based on each campus. MBC's main objective is to place in the public realm relevant material that will aid rational discussion on Canada's emerging immigration policy issues. MBC's task is to provide databases, analyses, and findings from a multidisciplinary academic team that address a wide range of issues in the fields of immigration and integration affecting Canada and the Vancouver region. Community stakeholders also influence MBC's research and facilitate the dissemination of its findings.

The Metropolis British Columbia working paper series includes nearly 300 research reports, which have contributed substantially to our understanding of immigration and ethnic diversity in Canada. MBC also holds several different symposia each year, which are designed to connect scholars, policy-makers and practitioners with each other to better understand, better use and better create our research.

We have nearly 100 affiliated researchers who are eligible to seek funding support from MBC. A major portion of these funds is dedicated to graduate students in the form of Research Assistantships. Each year, MBC, in partnership with the Accelerate BC program of MITACS Inc, arranges internship placements for graduate students with local NGOs and governmental departments. Through these, students are better connected to the needs of organizations that deal with immigration and diversity issues, while developing professional relationships with, and gaining exposure to, non-academic institutions. Partner organizations are able to expand their research capacity through access to highly-qualified researchers who use the latest trends in their analysis of immigration and diversity in Canada.

Établi en 1996 dans le cadre du projet Metropolis national et financé par les gouvernements fédéral et provincial ainsi que les universités associées, le Centre Metropolis de la Colombie-Britannique (MBC) se trouve sur le campus de l'université Simon Fraser ainsi que sur celui de l'université de la Colombie Britannique; un codirecteur se trouve sur chaque campus. Le principal objectif du MBC est de diffuser dans le domaine public du matériel pertinent qui contribuera à une discussion rationnelle sur les questions émergentes au sujet des politiques canadiennes en matière d'immigration. La tâche du MBC est de fournir les bases de données, les analyses et les conclusions d'une équipe universitaire multidisciplinaire traitant d'un large éventail de questions dans les domaines de l'immigration et de l'intégration qui touchent le Canada et la région de Vancouver. Les intervenants de la collectivité influencent également la recherche du MBC et facilitent la diffusion des conclusions.

La série de documents de travail du MBC comprend près de 300 rapports de recherche, qui ont énormément contribué à notre compréhension de l'immigration et de la diversité ethnique au Canada. De plus, chaque année, le MBC organise plusieurs différents symposiums conçus afin de réunir les universitaires, les décideurs et les praticiens pour qu'ils comprennent, utilisent et peaufinent davantage nos recherches.

Nous avons près de 100 chercheurs associés qui peuvent obtenir du soutien financier auprès du MBC. Une importante portion de ces fonds est consacrée aux étudiants de cycles supérieurs sous forme de postes d'assistant à la recherche. Chaque année, en collaboration avec le programme Accelerate BC offert par MITACS Inc., le MBC organise des stages à l'intention d'étudiants de cycles supérieurs au sein d'organisations non gouvernementales locales et de ministères gouvernementaux. Grâce à ces stages, les étudiants comprennent mieux les besoins des organisations qui traitent de questions d'immigration et de diversité, tissent des relations professionnelles avec des établissements non universitaires et se familiarisent avec eux. Les organismes partenaires peuvent élargir leur capacité de recherche au moyen d'un accès à des chercheurs hautement qualifiés qui suivent les dernières tendances dans leur analyse de l'immigration et de la diversité au Canada.

Due to its industry leading commitment to the environment and sustainable practices, the hotel has been awarded 4 Green Keys by the Hotel Association of Canada's Eco-Rating Program. Here are some of the initiatives the Sheraton Wall Centre offers:

- Optional daily cleaning of guest linens and towels.
- Environmentally-friendly cleaning products.
- All un-served food is donated to local charities whenever possible
- Seasonal menus are developed highlighting locally available items to decrease the "farm to table" footprint.
- Appropriate recycling and composting programs have been implemented for oils and biodegradable food items.
- In their recent renovation, they re-furnished using existing furniture instead of purchasing new pieces.

Programs (Hemlock Printers)

Hemlock is committed to achieving the highest levels of environmentally sustainable and socially responsible business practices. The company has a long-standing history of sustainable practices and are committed to producing the highest quality printing with the least social and environmental impact. Hemlock has been at the forefront of this work since the early 1970s. In 2004, the company created a Sustainability Committee to increase the momentum of improvements to environmental performance and to boost the introduction of sustainable business practices. They were the first printer in Vancouver to remove isopropyl alcohol from their press dampening systems in the late 1980's, even though the use of harmful isopropyl alcohol in the printing process is not prohibited in British Columbia. They fostered the creation of CleanPrint BC and its promotion of environmental management among printers of various stripes in the mid 1990s. Today, environmental responsibility is an important consideration in all of Hemlock's business decisions.

Delegate Bags (Common Thread)

Common Thread is a cooperative of Canadian organizations that have sewing programs and enterprises. The cooperative provides brokering and production coordination for their members and other producers. Every Common Thread product is made in Canada from colourful, durable and washable re-purposed street banners or other similar recycled fabric. Common Thread produces high quality products that are both sustainable and support local social goals. The organizational members of Common Thread operate sewing programs and enterprises that provide a fair wage and meaningful, supportive work experiences. Some of these groups include:

Coast Mental Health started Sewing With Heart in 2003 as a way to provide work opportunities and skill development for people recovering from mental illness.

E.M.B.E.R.S. (Eastside Movement for Business & Economic Renewal Society) is based in Vancouver's Downtown Eastside where it provides programs and services that increase the sustainability of small business in the community.

Malalay, the Afghan Women's Sewing and Craft Co-op was started with the support of the Immigrant Services Society of BC and other organizations in 2004. Members provide dress-making services to the Afghan community and produce other sewing products on contract.

Travel and Transportation (Translink)

TransLink (The Greater Vancouver Area's Public Transportation System) is deeply committed to developing and maintaining a sustainable transportation system that meets the needs of people, organizations and businesses, and fosters the ecological, economic and social well-being of the Metro Vancouver region and beyond. Translink advances sustainability by providing and promoting sustainable transportation choices in the region, by managing and operating their business in an environmentally, socially, and economically responsible manner, by using their business leverage to advance sustainability and by promoting land use and transportation infrastructure decisions that are supportive of sustainable transportation. The organizers of Metropolis 2011 encourage all delegates to use Translink when traveling to and from the hotel. To further this end, one of the study tours uses the SkyTrain to explore immigrant-serving agencies along the route.

MOSAIC

MOSAIC has succeeded in implementing a fee-for-service enterprise in a non-profit setting, a service based on the solid pillars of talent, workmanship, vigor, dedication, loyalty and the expertise of professional translators and interpreters. The vision and management of this small enterprise is for the most part left in the capable hands of newcomers to Canada. The Language Services department, including its contractors, offers a small example of the faith that MOSAIC places in immigrants and the opportunities the agency is willing to provide people "without Canadian work experience" to show they are valuable contributors to our economy and society – truly a win-win situation.

Metropolis 2011 et nos initiatives en matière de durabilité

Metropolis 2011 accueille des délégués des quatre coins du Canada dans la belle ville de Vancouver, en Colombie-Britannique. Afin d'offrir ce qu'il y a de mieux à nos invités à la conférence et pour l'environnement que nous partageons, voici un message sur nos initiatives en matière de durabilité :

Hébergement et dispositions prises pour la conférence (hôtel Sheraton Wall Centre)

Le Sheraton Vancouver Wall Centre fait tout ce qui est en son pouvoir pour contribuer à la durabilité de la communauté et adhère sans faille à une philosophie corporative 'plus verte'. En raison des engagements prioritaires de l'industrie en faveur de l'environnement et de pratiques durables, l'hôtel s'est vu décerner quatre Clés vertes par le Programme d'éco-évaluation de l'Association des hôtels du Canada. - Mise en œuvre de programmes appropriés pour recycler les huiles et composter les aliments biodégradables.
- Au cours de leurs récents travaux de rénovation, ils ont remis à neuf du mobilier existant, plutôt que d'en racheter.

Programmes (imprimantes Hemlock)

Hemlock a pris l'engagement, dans ses pratiques d'entreprise, de parvenir au meilleur niveau en matière de durabilité environnementale et de responsabilité sociale. La société a aujourd'hui de solides antécédents de pratiques durables et tente de produire la meilleure qualité d'impression qui soit, avec un minimum d'effets sociaux et environnementaux. Hemlock est à l'avant-plan dans ce domaine depuis le début des années 70. En 2004, la société mettait sur pied un Comité de la durabilité pour renforcer le momentum des améliorations en matière de rendement écologique et accélérer l'introduction des pratiques durables dans l'entreprise. Ils ont été les premiers imprimeurs de Vancouver à supprimer l'alcool isopropylique dans les dispositifs d'amortissement de leurs presses, vers la fin des années 80, bien que l'utilisation de cet alcool nocif dans le processus d'impression ne soit pas interdit en Colombie-Britannique. Ils ont encouragé la création de CleanPrint BC et sa promotion de la gestion environnementale parmi différents types d'imprimeurs, au milieu des années 90. Aujourd'hui, la responsabilité environnementale est un élément important chez Hemlock dans toute décision d'entreprise.

Sacs des délégués (Common Thread)

Common Thread est une coopérative d'organisations canadiennes ayant des programmes et des entreprises de couture. La coopérative assure la coordination du courtage et de la production pour ses membres et d'autres producteurs. Chaque produit Common Thread est fait au Canada à partir de bannières ou d'autres tissus recyclés du même genre, colorés, durables, lavables. Common Thread produit des articles de qualité, à la fois durables et appuyant les objectifs sociaux de la région. Les membres de l'organisation Common Thread exploitent des programmes et des entreprises de couture qui paient équitablement leurs employés et leur fournissent une expérience de travail valorisante ainsi que du soutien. Certains de ces groupes sont :

Coast Mental Health a commencé avec Sewing With Heart en 2003, afin de créer de l'emploi et perfectionner les compétences des personnes qui se rétablissent des suites d'une maladie mentale.

E.M.B.E.R.S. (Eastside Movement for Business and Economic Renewal Society) est situé à Vancouver, dans l'est de la ville, où il met à la disposition des petites entreprises de la communauté des programmes et des services pouvant renforcer leur durabilité.

Malalay, une coopérative de couture et d'artisanat organisée par les femmes afghanes, a ouvert en 2004, avec l'aide de la société des services aux immigrants de Colombie-Britannique et d'autres organismes. Ses membres fournissent des services de couture à la communauté afghane, ainsi que d'autres travaux de couture à contrat.

Voyage et transport (Translink)

TransLink (le système de transport en commun de Vancouver et de sa banlieue) est fermement engagé dans le développement et le maintien d'un système de transport pouvant répondre aux besoins des usagers, des organisations et des entreprises; Translink fait la promotion du bien-être écologique, économique et social de Vancouver et de sa région et bien au-delà. Translink travaille à l'avancement de la durabilité en mettant à la disposition de l'usager des choix de transport durable dans la région, en en faisant la promotion, en gérant et en exploitant son entreprise sur un mode responsable, autant sur le plan environnemental, que social et économique; Translink utilise le poids de son entreprise pour faire avancer la cause de la durabilité; il fait la promotion de la bonne utilisation du sol et prend des décisions sur l'infrastructure des transports dans le sens d'un soutien au transport durable. Le département des services linguistiques, y compris ses entrepreneurs, offre un petit exemple de la confiance que MOSAIC accorde aux immigrants et des opportunités que l'agence est prête à offrir à des personnes sans 'expérience canadienne', juste pour montrer qu'elles peuvent contribuer de façon importante à notre économie et notre société – une situation gagnante sur tous les plans.

Manolo Abella is Senior Research Associate for the Centre on Migration, Policy and Society (COMPAS) at the University of Oxford. He was formerly Director of the International Migration Programme of the ILO in Geneva, and a member of COMPAS' Advisory Board. He has been very actively involved in international efforts to develop a multilateral framework for the management of labour migration and spent many years writing and rendering advice to governments on policies and best practices. He is at present working on what various academic disciplines have to offer to improve the management of migration, and how this knowledge can best be organized for training of senior government officials.

Manolo Abella est associé de recherche principal au *Centre on Migration, Policy and Society (COMPAS)* de l'Université d'Oxford. Khalid Koser is Academic Dean and Head of the New Issues in Security Programme of the Geneva Centre for Security Policy. He is also Non-Resident Senior Fellow in Foreign Policy Studies at the Brookings Institution in Washington D.C., Research Associate at the Graduate Institute of International and Development Studies in Geneva, Non-resident Fellow at the Lowy Institute for International Policy in Sydney, Australia, and Associate Fellow of the Global Health Security Programme at Chatham House. He was previously Deputy Director of the Brookings-Bern Project on Internal Displacement from 2006 to 2008, and Senior Policy Analyst for the Global Commission on International Migration from 2004 to 2006. Dr. Koser is chair of the UK's Independent Advisory Group on Country Information and co-editor of the *Journal of Refugee Studies*.

Robert McLeman is associate professor in the Department of Geography at the University of Ottawa, and Coordinator of the Environmental Studies Program. Dr. McLeman collaborates with researchers in Canada and abroad, and through organizations such as the International Institute for Sustainable Development, on a variety of research projects that investigate interactions between environmental change, human wellbeing, migration and state security. Prior to this, he acted as First Secretary and Immigration Control Officer at the Canadian Embassy in Vienna, Austria, from 1999 to 2002, and as Vice Consul and Immigration Operations Manager at the Canadian Consulate General in Seattle. As a Third and Second Secretary, Dr. McLeman also worked in Hong Kong, New Delhi and Belgrade.



Peter Showler is the Director of the Refugee Forum, located at the Human Rights Research and Education Centre, University of Ottawa. The Refugee Forum undertakes research and communications projects dealing with refugee law. He is also an Adjunct Professor at the University of Ottawa law school where he teaches Advanced Refugee Law.

Mr. Showler is the former Chairperson of the Immigration and Refugee Board of Canada (1999-2002) and served as the Gordon F. Henderson Chair in Human Rights (2003-04) at the University of Ottawa. He has worked on refugee projects in Africa for both the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees and Amnesty International. He is the author of *Refugee Sandwich: Stories of Exile and Asylum* and most recently, *Fast Fair and Final: Reforming Canada's Refugee System*, a report published by the Maytree Foundation in September, 2009. Mr. Showler frequently speaks and writes on refugee issues.

Earlier in his career, Mr. Showler sat as a member of the IRB (1994-99) and practiced immigration and refugee law (1986-94) while serving as the Co-Director of Ottawa-Carleton Community Legal Services, a community legal clinic providing free legal services in traditional poverty law areas.

Il a participé à des projets sur les réfugiés en Afrique pour le Haut Commissariat des Nations Unies pour les réfugiés et Amnesty International. Il est l'auteur de *Refugee Sandwich: stories of exile and asylum* et de *Fast Fair and Final: Reforming Canada's Refugee System*, un rapport publié par la *Maytree Foundation* en septembre 2009. M. Showler parle fréquemment des questions relatives aux réfugiés et écrit aussi sur ce sujet.

In particular, she was Chief of the Mortality and Migration Section of the Division from 1993 to 1999 and she directed the Population Estimates and Projections Section from 1999 to 2003. Ms. Zlotnik's work has spanned the field of demography, covering the analysis of fertility, mortality, migration and urbanization, with a special emphasis on their quantitative aspects. As Director of the Population Division, she was also responsible for the preparations of the High-level Dialogue on International Migration and Development that the General Assembly conducted in 2006.

Ann H. Kim is an assistant professor of sociology at York University. She is an affiliate of CERIS-The Ontario Metropolis Centre and a Faculty Associate of the *York Centre for Asian Research*. Her research is largely motivated by questions related to the immigrant and ethnic integration process and the factors that contribute to differing paths of integration. She has studied the experiences of Korean immigrants in relation to ethnic entrepreneurship, living arrangements, and new destinations, and currently, she is working on two major projects, one on Korean transnational families and another on the gendered and racialized patterns of economic security among seniors.

In 2010, he was a Fulbright Senior Scholar at the University of California Berkeley.

Her focus on gendered migration within transnational contexts includes examining the phenomena of India-Canada transnational marriages, and skilled emigration of nurses from India. In terms of transnational networks she has published a number of articles highlighting the role of immigration and remittances in transnational community formation and immigration trade links.


Rima Berns-McGown teaches diaspora studies with the Centre for Diaspora and Transnational Studies and the Department of Historical Studies at the University of Toronto. Her first book, *Muslims in the Diaspora: The Somali Communities of London and Toronto*, explored the renegotiation of identity and religion that Somali refugees undertook in the first years after moving into the West. Her more recent publications include articles based on further interviews with Somali women, on political culture, and on the dynamics between diasporic communities and the wider society. Her current research focuses on interviews with Somali-Canadian youth on questions of identity and belonging.

Rima Berns-McGown est professeure d'études sur la diaspora au *Centre for Diaspora and Transnational Studies* et au département d'études historiques à l'Université de Toronto. Son premier livre, *Muslims in the Diaspora: The Somali Communities of London and Toronto*, explore la révision de l'identité et de la religion entreprise par les réfugiés somaliens au cours des premières années qui suivent leur déménagement en Occident. Ses plus récentes publications comprennent des articles fondés sur des entrevues approfondies avec des femmes somaliennes, sur la culture politique et sur la dynamique entre les communautés diasporiques et la société en général. Ses recherches actuelles portent principalement sur des entrevues avec des jeunes somalo-canadiens sur des questions liées à l'identité et à l'appartenance.



David Carment is professor of International Affairs at the *Norman Paterson School of International Affairs* at Carleton University. His primary research interests fall into the categories of conflict prevention, conflict resolution, ethnic conflict, peacekeeping, internet technology, and Canadian foreign affairs. Dr. Carment is Fellow of the *Canadian Defence and Foreign Affairs Institute* (CDFAI), and serves as the principal investigator for the *Country Indicators for Foreign Policy* project (CIFP). Two of his most recent books include *Security, Development and the Fragile State: Bridging the Gap between Theory and Policy* (with Teddy Samy and Stewary Prest) and *The World in Canada: Diaspora, Demography and Domestic Politics* co edited with David Bercuson.

David Carment est professeur d'affaires internationales à la *Norman Paterson School of International Affairs* à l'Université Carleton. He currently manages research and academic relations for the Strategic Policy Branch at Public Safety Canada, where the focus is broad engagement with the research/academic community on public safety and national security issues. Key areas of work include the National Justice Statistics Initiative; the Justice, Policing and Security research domain within the Metropolis project on immigration, diversity and integration issues; and research related to community resilience, and to countering violent extremism. He has recently been appointed lead of the Psycho-Social cluster of research for the Centre for Security Science, under Defence Research and Development Canada. The cluster's two streams are preparedness and resilience, and radicalization leading to violence.

John Monahan is the Executive Director of the Mosaic Institute, a “think and do” tank that harnesses the creativity, connections and resources of Canada’s ethnocultural communities to advance Canadian solutions to intractable conflicts overseas, starting right here at home.

Founded in 2007, the Mosaic Institute has already made important contributions nationally in the areas of inter-community dialogue, the integration of diaspora communities into the Canadian foreign policy mainstream, and the promotion of global citizenship.

Previously, John held a number of senior roles with the Government of Ontario related to economic development, business immigration, and trade. He also practised employment and immigration law in Toronto.

John Monahan est le directeur exécutif du Mosaic Institute, un réservoir « de pensées et d’actions » qui tire parti de la créativité, des connexions et des ressources des communautés ethnoculturelles du Canada dans le but de proposer des solutions canadiennes aux conflits insolubles à l’étranger, lesquels débutteront ici même, à la maison.

Fondé en 2007, le Mosaic Institute a déjà apporté d’importantes contributions à l’échelle nationale dans les domaines du dialogue intercommunautaire, de l’intégration des communautés diasporiques dans la politique étrangère canadienne et de la promotion de la citoyenneté mondiale.

Stevan Weine is Professor of Psychiatry and Director of the *International Center on Responses to Catastrophes*, at the University of Illinois at Chicago. He was co-founder and co-director of the *Project on Genocide, Psychiatry and Witnessing*, which provides family-focused community based mental health services to Bosnians, conducts interdisciplinary research on survivors, and engages in mental health reform in post-war countries. He was awarded a Career Scientist Award from the National Institute of Mental Health on “Services Based Research with Refugee Families” for which he is conducting an ethnography of Bosnian adolescents and their families. Dr. Weine is also Principal Investigator of two National Institute of Health funded studies: *An Ethnographic Study of Preventive Mental Health Services for Adolescent Refugees and Migrancy, Masculinity, and Preventing HIV in Tajik Male Migrant Workers*.

Stevan Weine est professeur de psychiatrie et directeur du *International Center on Responses to Catastrophes*, à l’Université de l’Illinois, à Chicago. Il est le cofondateur et le codirecteur du projet sur le génocide, la psychiatrie et les témoins (Project on Genocide, Psychiatry and Witnessing), qui offre des services de santé mentale communautaires axés sur la famille aux Bosniaques, mène des recherches interdisciplinaires sur les survivants et se consacre à la réforme des soins de santé mentale dans les pays qui sortent d’une guerre. Il a reçu un prix de carrière en recherche du National Institute of Mental Health pour ses travaux sur les services auprès des familles de réfugiés dans le cadre desquelles il fait l’ethnographie des adolescents bosniaques et de leurs familles. M. Weine est également le chercheur principal de deux études financées par la National Institute of Health : Étude ethnographique des services de soins de santé mentale préventifs chez les adolescents réfugiés (An Ethnographic Study of Preventive Mental Health Services for Adolescent Refugees) et Migration, masculinité et prévention du VIH chez les travailleurs migrants tadjiks de sexe masculin (Migrancy, Masculinity, and Preventing HIV in Tajik Male Migrant Workers).

In 2009 she was appointed to the International Geographical Union (IGU) Commission on Gender and Geography Steering Committee.

Claire Dwyer enseigne au département de géographie à l'University College of London depuis 1995. Ms. Germain has written numerous articles and books on Montreal, including *Montreal: The Quest for a Metropolis* (with D. Rose, published in 2000 by John Wiley & Sons, London). She is particularly interested in immigrant neighbourhoods and municipal management of diversity, including religion.

An anthropologist and urban studies specialist, he is the author, editor or co-editor of numerous articles, book chapters, reports and books on the sociology, politics and economics of post-migration processes. They include *Immigrant Businesses: The Economic, Political and Social Environment* (Macmillan, 2000); *Unravelling the Rag Trade: Immigrant Entrepreneurship in Seven World Cities* (Berg/New York University Press, 2002); *Immigrant Entrepreneurs: Venturing Abroad in the Age of Globalization* (Berg, 2003), *Tourism, Ethnic Diversity, and the City* (Routledge, 2007), *Ethnic Amsterdam* (Amsterdam University Press, 2009), *Selected Studies in International Migration and Immigrant Incorporation* (Amsterdam University Press, 2010), and *Selling Ethnic Neighborhoods* (Routledge, 2011).

Jan Rath est professeur de sociologie urbaine, chef du département de sociologie et d'anthropologie, et directeur de l'*Institute for Migration and Ethnic Studies* (IMES) de l'Université d'Amsterdam. David Butler-Jones is Canada's first Chief Public Health Officer. He heads the Public Health Agency of Canada which provides leadership on the government's efforts to protect and promote the health and safety of Canadians.

He has worked in many parts of Canada in both Public Health and Clinical Medicine, and has consulted in a number of other countries.

Dr. Butler-Jones has taught at both the undergraduate and graduate levels and has been involved as a researcher in a broad range of public health issues. He is a Professor in the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Manitoba as well as a Clinical Professor with the Department of Community Health and Epidemiology at the University of Saskatchewan's College of Medicine.

From 1995 to 2002, Dr. Butler-Jones was Chief Medical Health Officer and Executive Director of the Population Health and Primary Health Services Branches for the Province of Saskatchewan.

Dr. Butler-Jones has served with a number of organizations including as: President of the Canadian Public Health Association; Vice President of the American Public Health Association; Chair of the Canadian Roundtable on Health and Climate Change; International Regent on the board of the American College of Preventive Medicine; Member of the Governing Council for the Canadian Population Health Initiative; Chair of the National Coalition on Enhancing Preventive Practices of Health Professionals; and Co-Chair of the Canadian Coalition for Public Health in the 21st Century.

In recognition of his service in the field of public health, York University's Faculty of Health bestowed on Dr. Butler-Jones an honorary Doctor of Laws degree.

David Butler-Jones, premier administrateur en chef de la santé publique du Canada, dirige l'Agence de la santé publique du Canada, qui canalise les efforts du gouvernement pour protéger et promouvoir la santé et la sécurité des Canadiens.

Auparavant, il a œuvré dans les domaines de la santé publique et de la médecine clinique dans plusieurs régions du Canada et a travaillé comme consultant dans nombre d'autres pays.

Il a également enseigné au premier cycle et aux études supérieures, est professeur à la faculté de médecine de l'Université du Manitoba et professeur clinicien au département de santé communautaire et d'épidémiologie du collège de médecine de l'Université de la Saskatchewan. Il a participé à des travaux de recherche portant sur une vaste gamme de questions de santé publique.

De 1995 à 2002, le Dr Butler-Jones a occupé les fonctions de médecin hygiéniste en chef de la Saskatchewan et de directeur administratif de la direction générale de la santé de la population et des services de soins de santé primaires (Population Health and Primary Health Services Branch) de cette province.

Dr. Butler-Jones a également occupé les fonctions de président de l'Association canadienne de santé publique, de vice-président de l'American Public Health Association, de président de la Table ronde sur la santé et le changement climatique du Canada, de représentant international au sein du conseil de l'American College of Preventive Medicine, de membre du conseil de l'Initiative sur la santé de la population canadienne, de président de la coalition canadienne pour accroître la prévention dans la pratique des professionnels de la santé, et de coprésident de la Coalition canadienne pour la santé publique au 21e siècle.

Dr. Butler-Jones a reçu un doctorat honorifique en droit de la faculté des sciences de la santé de l'Université York en reconnaissance de ses réalisations en santé publique.



Maylene Fong has over 27 years of nursing experience, starting her career in the acute care setting and moved to the community holding leadership roles. She completed her Masters degree in Nursing from the University of British Columbia with her thesis focusing on Chronic Disease Management. She currently holds a dual role with Vancouver Coastal Health, a half position as a Clinical Nurse Specialist for Chronic Disease Prevention and Management and the other half position as the Manager of the Healthy Living Program. This program focuses on Health Promotion and Chronic Disease Prevention for high risk populations affected by determinants of health. The program is aimed at individuals with low income, immigrants and high risk ethnic populations. She is also involved in prediabetes research.

Maylene Fong a plus de 27 ans d'expérience en soins infirmiers. Elle a commencé sa carrière dans le milieu des soins actifs et a poursuivi dans le milieu communautaire, où elle a occupé des rôles de leader. Immigration, diversité et santé publique suite



David McKeown is Medical Officer of Health for the City of Toronto and Executive Officer of the Toronto Board of Health. He has worked in the public health field for 25 years, the last six as head of Toronto Public Health, Canada's largest local public health agency. Toronto Public Health provides a full range of public health programs and services to 2.6 million people in one of the most diverse cities in the world, nearly half of whom were born outside Canada. As Toronto's Medical Officer of Health Dr. McKeown has been an outspoken advocate for healthy public policy and action to reduce health inequities.

David McKeown est médecin hygiéniste pour la ville de Toronto. Il a travaillé dans le domaine de la santé publique pendant 25 ans, et, les six dernières années, il était président du conseil de santé de Toronto, le plus important service de santé publique du Canada. Le conseil de santé de Toronto fournit un éventail de programmes et de services en matière de santé publique à 2,6 millions de personnes dans l'une des villes les plus diversifiées du monde, où près de la moitié des résidents sont nées à l'extérieur du Canada. En tant que médecin hygiéniste de la ville de Toronto, M. McKeown défend avec conviction des politiques et des mesures dans le domaine de la santé publique visant à réduire les inégalités en matière de santé.



Lawrence Santiago is a Trudeau Scholar and PhD Candidate from the Department of Geography, University of British Columbia, where he is finishing his dissertation on how state, international and private sector institutions influence the ethical and sustainable recruitment of healthcare workers from the developing world. His work is based on an 18-month global ethnographic fieldwork in the Philippines, Canada, the United States, the United Kingdom, and Geneva. From May-November 2010, he was a Metropolis BC-MITACS intern and worked at *Health Match BC*, (a health care recruitment service funded by the government of British Columbia) where he led organizing the academic-policy workshop *Health Worker Migration in Canada: Histories, Geographies, Ethics*.

Lawrence Santiago est lauréat d'un prix de recherche Trudeau et candidat au doctorat du département de géographie de l'université de la Colombie Britannique, où il termine sa dissertation sur l'influence qu'ont les établissements étatiques, internationaux et privés sur le recrutement éthique et durable de travailleurs en soins de santé des pays en voie de développement. Sa recherche est fondée sur des études sur le terrain, ethnographiques et globales, d'une durée de 18 mois, aux Philippines, au Canada, aux États Unis, au Royaume-Uni et à Genève. De mai à novembre 2010, il était stagiaire chez Metropolis BC MITACS et travaillait chez *Health Match BC*, une agence de recrutement en soins de santé financée par le gouvernement de la Colombie Britannique. Dans le cadre de ce stage, il a organisé l'atelier stratégique et universitaire intitulé « Migration au Canada de travailleurs en soins de santé : historique, géographie, éthique » (*Health Worker Migration in Canada : Histories, Geographies, Ethics*).



Laura Simich has conducted research with various refugee and immigrant communities in the Social and Epidemiological Research Program at the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health in Toronto where she is currently an Affiliate Scientist. She is also Assistant Professor of Psychiatry and Anthropology at the University of Toronto. She was appointed Health and Wellbeing Research Domain Leader of the Ontario Metropolis Centre in 2008. Her primary research interests are resilience, social support and social determinants of health in immigrant communities, and she continues to explore issues of immigrant status, security and wellbeing.

Laura Simich mène des recherches avec diverses communautés de réfugiés et d'immigrants dans le cadre du programme de recherche sociale et épidémiologie du Centre de toxicomanie et de santé mentale de Toronto, où elle est actuellement scientifique affiliée. Elle est également professeure adjointe du département de psychiatrie et d'anthropologie de l'université de Toronto. En 2008, elle a été nommée responsable du domaine de la santé et du bien-être du Centre Metropolis de l'Ontario. Ses principaux intérêts en matière de recherche sont la résilience, le soutien social et les déterminants sociaux de la santé dans les communautés immigrantes. De plus, elle continue d'examiner les questions liées au statut, à la sécurité et au bien être des immigrants.

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
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
