Topic: **Daily or Occasional Smokers**

Released by Statistics Canada – June 19, 2012

Background: In 2011, more than half of the population aged 12 years and over in Nunavut's 10 largest communities were daily or occasional smokers. This is the highest proportion of smokers in all provinces and territories and three times the national average of **20%**.

The proportion of daily or occasional smokers in Nunavut's 10 largest communities has declined from **65%** in 2003 to **60%** in 2011.

In Nunavut's 10 largest communities, smoking rates were highest among 35 to 44 year-olds where about 7 out of 10 in that age group smoked daily or occasionally in 2011.
