

A Historical Note

Before the European explorations, Prince Edward Island was frequently used by the Mi'kmaq People for fishing, hunting and some planting. The Mi'kmaq called the island *Epekwitk*, meaning "cradle on the waves." Europeans later changed the pronunciation of the name to *Abegweit*. Historians credit the European discovery of the Island to Jacques Cartier, the French navigator, who claimed the Island for Francis I, King of France, on July 1, 1534. In 1720 the Island, then called *Île Saint Jean*, was colonized by 300 French settlers, sponsored by a commercial company of the Comte de Saint Pierre. The Island was ceded to Great Britain in 1763. Two years later the designated capital city of the *Island of St. John* took on the name *Charlotte Town* in honour of Queen Charlotte, wife of King George III of England. In 1799 the colony was renamed Prince Edward Island in honour of Edward, Duke of Kent, who was then commander of the British forces in North America. Prince Edward Island is known as the "Cradle of Confederation", because the Charlottetown Conference, held there in 1864, initiated the movement toward Canada's federation. The Island became a province in 1873.

The Armorial Bearings of the Province of Prince Edward Island, shown above, were proclaimed to come into force on December 13, 2002. The centrepiece is the Shield of Arms, granted by King Edward VII in 1905, featuring the English heraldic lion, a large oak tree on the right and three young saplings on the left. The mature tree originally represented England, while the three saplings stand for the three counties - Kings, Queens and Prince. Scrolled along the bottom of the Shield of Arms are the Latin words *Parva Sub Ingenti*, which, when translated, read: *The small under the protection of the great*. The surrounding elements of the Armorial Bearings illustrate significant characteristics of the province, its position in the Canadian federation, its founding peoples and its natural resources.

The design of the Prince Edward Island Flag is modelled after the Coat of Arms in rectangular shape and is bordered on the three sides away from the mast by alternate bands of red and white. The official flag was established March 24, 1964.



Winter is the ideal time for sighting the Blue Jay, its shrill cries cutting the silence of the crisp winter air.



Samuel Holland's Survey of the Island of St. John

Captain Samuel J. Holland surveyed and mapped Prince Edward Island, then known as the Island of St. John, between 1764 and 1766. During the survey, Holland used innovative instruments such as the astronomical clock and the refracting telescope. Economic Review 2021

Overview

Following significant contractions in 2020 due to the Covid-19 pandemic, many sectors of the Canadian economy began to rebound in 2021. Although all jurisdictions across the country continued to deploy health measures to slow the spread of the coronavirus at various times as variants emerged, many sectors were able to resume operations at normal or near normal levels. Output of client-facing businesses such as restaurants, hotels, museums, movie theatres, airlines and clothing stores was, for the most part, still well below pre-pandemic levels in every jurisdiction. Real gross domestic product (GDP) rose in every province and territory except Saskatchewan in 2021.

GDP by industry for Prince Edward Island expanded by 6.6 per cent in 2021. Increases were recorded in 16 of the 20 major industry groups. Notable leading growth sectors in the province were (in 2012 chained prices) agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting (up by \$62.3 million or 16.3 per cent), construction (up by \$45.0 million or 10.2 per cent), and manufacturing (up by \$37.6 million or 6.3 per cent). Notable declines occurred in management of companies and enterprises (down by \$2.3 million or 26.4 per cent), utilities (down by \$0.6 million or 0.6 per cent) and transportation and warehousing (down by \$0.5 million or 4.4 per cent).

GDP Income and Expenditure tables for 2021 are expected to be released by Statistics Canada in the fall of 2022.

According to the Labour Force Survey, employment on Prince Edward Island increased by 3.5 per cent to average 79,400 for the year, following a 3.2 per cent decline in 2020. The unemployment rate averaged 9.2 per cent in 2021, down 1.2 percentage points from 2020. According to the Survey of Employment, Payrolls and Hours, employment on Prince Edward Island was up by 7.7 per cent in 2021 while total labour income increased by 10.7 per cent.


The *All-Items Consumer Price Index* (CPI) for Prince Edward Island was up 5.1 per cent in 2021 compared to 2020. Energy prices increased 26.6 per cent, while food prices increased 3.2 per cent and shelter was up by 8.5 per cent. The *All-Items CPI* for Canada increased by 3.4 per cent in 2021.

Manufacturing shipments on Prince Edward Island increased by 15.3 per cent to \$2.6 billion in 2021. This follows a decline of 4.3 per cent in 2020. According to Industry Canada, the value of P.E.I.'s international exports of goods rose by 12.5 per cent in 2021 to reach \$1.7 billion, a new all time high. This follows increases of 7.7 per cent and 1.1 per cent and in 2019 and 2020 respectively.

The Canadian Economy

Nationally, the economy rebounded in 2021 following a contraction of 5.2 per cent in 2020, with growth of 4.6 per cent. Economic growth contracted during the second quarter, down 0.9 per cent. GDP rebounded in the second half of 2021, expanding by 1.3 per cent in the third quarter and 1.6 per cent in the fourth quarter.

Statistics Canada estimates that the Canadian economy expanded by 1.9 per cent in 2019 and contracted by 5.2 per cent in 2020. Diagram 1 shows quarterly real GDP growth between 2018 and 2021.



Exports of goods and services increased by 1.4 per cent, following a decline of 9.7 per cent in 2020. Household final consumption expenditure rose by 5.2 per cent growth following a 6.2 per cent decrease in 2020.²

GDP for goods producing industries increased by 0.1 per cent in 2021 while service producing industries rose 2.5 per cent. Notable increases included *health care and social assistance*, up 7.9 per cent, *real estate and rental and leasing*, up 3.5 per cent, *mining*, *quarrying*, *and oil and gas extraction* up 6.3 per cent, *professional*, *scientific and technical services*, up 7.0 per cent, and *construction*, up 5.7 per cent. Industrial sectors showing declines were *utilities*, down 1.4 per cent, and *primary industries*, down 6.5 per cent³.


The all-items consumer price index for Canada increased 3.4 per cent in 2021. Notable increases were in *energy*, up 18.9 per cent, *transportation*, up 7.2 per cent, *shelter*, up 3.9 per cent, *health and personal care*, up 2.6 per cent, and *food*, up 2.5 per cent. Core inflation (all items excluding food and energy) was 2.3 per cent

in 2021.⁴ As commodity prices increased, the Canadian dollar exchange rate remained steady throughout 2021, averaging \$1.25 US. This was mainly due to the strength of the US dollar.

Employment increased by 4.8 per cent to 18.9 million, while the unemployment rate averaged 7.5 per cent in 2021, a decrease of 2.0 percentage points from 2020.⁵ Employment gains were recorded in both the services sector (up 5.3 per cent) and the goods sector (up 3.0 per cent). Employment was up in every major sector, with the exception of *agriculture* (down 9.9 per cent) and *other services* (down 0.4 per cent). In December 2021, there were 37,000 fewer people working in agriculture compared with 12 months earlier, with nearly all of the losses attributable to self-employment (not seasonally adjusted). Businesses in agriculture faced significant challenges in 2021, including hot and dry weather impacting the growing season in Western Canada. Notable employment growth occurred in *professional, scientific and technical services*, up 9.5 per cent, *wholesale and retail trade*, up 5.1 per cent, and *health care and social assistance*, up 4.9 per cent.⁶ Diagram 2 shows percent employment change in Canada by sector.







The American Economy

Real GDP growth in the United States increased 5.7 per cent in 2021, after contracting by 3.4 per cent in 2020, at the height of the Covid-19 pandemic. The increase in GDP for 2021 was mainly due to increases in personal consumption expenditure, non-residential fixed investment, exports, residential fixed investment, and private inventory investment. Diagram 3 shows U.S. GDP growth from 2012 to 2021.



Employment in the United States grew by 3.2 per cent in 2021 and the unemployment rate fell by 2.7 percentage points from 8.1 per cent in 2020 to 5.4 per cent.⁸ Diagram 4 shows U.S. employment and unemployment rate from 2012 to 2021.





The Prince Edward Island Economy

Following a contraction of 1.8 per cent in 2020, PEI's economy saw solid economic performance in 2021, growing by 6.6 per cent. A comprehensive Covid-19 management strategy throughout 2021 allowed the majority of the economy to continue to function. Despite the curtailment of economic activity in December, the Island economy has made up ground lost in the pandemic in most sectors, and continuing to new heights in others. The Island continued to be a destination for international and inter-provincial migrants, which in turn had an impact on the growth in domestic demand. New records were set in retail and wholesale trade, and investment in building construction, with employment exceeding pre-pandemic levels by late fall 2021. The Island produced goods and services that were desired by purchasers, both domestic and international, as shipments overtook pre-pandemic levels and exports continued to grow. Like other jurisdictions, the Island saw rising inflation and supply chain challenges that continued to be a feature of the pandemic. Although border restrictions were eased in various stages for travelers over the summer months, the tourism industry continued to feel the effects of the pandemic throughout 2021.

Gross Domestic Product

Statistics Canada preliminary estimates of GDP by Industry indicate that the Prince Edward Island economy grew by 6.6 per cent in chained 2012 dollars in 2021, following a contraction of 1.8 per cent in 2020 and 4.6 per cent growth in 2019. 

Consumer Prices

The *All-Items Consumer Price Index* for Prince Edward Island increased 5.1 per cent in 2021, following no change in 2020. Core inflation, the year-over-year rate of change of the CPI excluding food, energy, and the effects of changes in indirect taxes, rose by 2.9 per cent in 2021. Food prices increased by 3.2 per cent over 2020, while shelter prices rose by 8.5 per cent. The CPI Energy index increased 26.6 per cent in 2021 following a drop of 14.2 per cent in 2020.¹¹

Diagram 6 shows the annual average price of unleaded gasoline and fuel oil sold on Prince Edward Island between 2014 and 2021. Gasoline prices (regular self-serve) averaged \$1.308 per litre for 2021. Prices began the year at a low of \$1.019 and rose steadily all year to a high of \$1.439 per litre in October. The price of home heating oil averaged \$1.01 per litre in 2021, ranging from a high of \$1.201 per litre in November to a low of \$0.813 per litre in January. 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

Labour Force

Employment on Prince Edward Island increased by 3.5 per cent, following a decline of 3.2 per cent in 2020, which was a result of the restrictions put in place to control the spread of COVID-19. Employment averaged 79,400 people, a new all-time high for annual employment on Prince Edward Island. However some industries continued to struggle to recover from the pandemic throughout 2021. Employment in the goodsproducing sector decreased by 1.5 per cent in 2021, with employment levels dropping in agriculture (-7.7 per cent) and construction (-11.9 per cent). Employment in the service providing sector increased by 5.3 per cent. The labour force participation rate increased from 64.7 per cent in 2020 to 65.1 per cent in 2021. The annual average unemployment rate declined from 2016 to 2019 to reach the lowest annual rate on current record (since 1976) in 2019 of 8.8 per cent. The rate increased to 10.4 per cent in 2020 during the pandemic. In 2021, the unemployment rate fell 1.2 percentage points to 9.2 per cent.¹³

Diagram 7 shows that the *construction* industry incurred the most employment losses in 2021. Other notable losses occurred in *agriculture, transportation and warehousing,* and *finance, insurance and real estate.* Notable employment increases occurred in *health care and social assistance, public administration, educational services* and *trade*.¹⁴





Statistics Canada's Survey of Employment, Payrolls and Hours (SEPH) shows that payroll employment on Prince Edward Island increased by 7.7 per cent in 2021, following a decrease of 6.5 per cent in 2020. By this measure, employment increased in every sector, with the exception of *finance and insurance*. Notable employment growth was seen in *administrative support* and *accommodation and food services*. ¹⁵ For more information about the labour force see Tables 16 to 23.

Income

Statistics Canada estimates that labour income for Prince Edward Island rose 10.2 per cent to reach \$4.2 billion in 2021. Diagram 8 shows labour income growth from 2012 to 2021. The major contributors to growth in 2021 were in educational services (up by 19.5 per cent), professional and personal services (up by 12.6 per cent), and federal government public administration (up by 17.2 per cent). Population

Despite the continued effects of the COVID-19 pandemic into 2021, and the border restrictions put in place to contain it, the Island's population continued to grow. As of July 1, 2021, the population of Prince Edward Island was estimated to be 164,318, an increase of 2,989 persons, or 1.9 per cent, over 2020. The population of Canada increased by 0.5 per cent over the same period.

International immigration was slowed by the pandemic in 2020 and into the first half of 2021. The number of immigrants arriving on PEI from July 1, 2020 to June 30, 2021 declined 41.8 per cent as compared to previous 12 month period, following an 8.3 per cent drop in 2019/20. The second quarter of 2021 showed signs of recovery, with a 15.9 per cent increase as compared to the second quarter of 2020. Preliminary data show that 1,211 immigrants arrived on Prince Edward Island in 2020/21. Other international migration¹⁷ totaled 864, resulting in a total of 2,075 for net international migration.

Net interprovincial migration was +990, with Ontario, Nova Scotia, and Alberta being the top provinces of origin for PEI's inter-provincial in-migrants. Revised 2019-20 population estimates now show PEI's net interprovincial migration was +1,150 over that period, revised from the preliminary estimate of -462. Estimates of interprovincial migration can be found in tables 5A and 5B.

Between July 1, 2020 and June 30, 2021, the total number of Island births was an estimated 1,317. The number of deaths was estimated to be 1,393, resulting in natural growth (births minus deaths) of -76.¹⁸


The aging of the Island population is illustrated by the fact that the median age¹⁹ has risen from 24.8 years in 1971 to 42.4 years in 2021. Although the median age has declined from 43.9 in 2016, this downward trend is not projected to continue. Furthermore, while only 11.0 per cent of the population was 65 years and older in 1971, this proportion had risen to 20.2 per cent in 2021. The total dependency ratio²⁰ reached a low of 46.8 in 2007 and changed very little from 2007 to 2011. This ratio has increased from 47.0 to 54.1 in the last ten years.²¹

According to the 2021 Census of Population count on May 11, 2021 there were 154,331 persons living on Prince Edward Island at that time.²² For more information on population and Census see Tables 1 to 15.

Industrial Profiles

Manufacturing

Total shipments increased by 15.3 per cent in 2021 to a value of \$2.6 billion, a new all-time high. Prior to the pandemic, manufacturing shipments had increased every year since 2010. Durables good increased 11.5 per cent, while shipments of non-durable goods rose by 17.1 per cent.²³ Diagram 9 shows total manufacturing shipments for Prince Edward Island from 2016 to 2021. Employment in the manufacturing sector increased 6.0 per cent over 2020 to reach 7,100 in 2021.²⁴

Exports

According to Industry Canada, the total value of exported goods grew from \$1.5 billion in 2020 to \$1.7 billion in 2021, an increase of 12.5 per cent. Exports of seafood products made up 26.8 per cent of all international exports of goods in 2021. Its value increased from \$252.0 million in 2020 to \$454.3 million in 2021, an increase of 80.3 per cent. Other exports included frozen food products valued at \$402.8 million (down 4.0 per cent from 2020), \$113.8 million in vegetable and melon farming (down by 7.7 per cent) and \$92.4 million in pharmaceutical and medicine (down by 12.1 per cent). Agriculture


Farm cash receipts for 2021 totaled \$568.1 million, a decrease of 1.4 per cent over 2020. This compares to an increase of 14.9 per cent for Canada as a whole. Total crop receipts for PEI totaled \$369.7 million, a decrease of 0.5 per cent. Potato receipts, which made up 63.4 per cent of total crop receipts, decreased 7.1 per cent to total \$234.3 million. Total livestock receipts increased by 9.4 per cent to \$167.0 million, largely due to a 68.1 per cent rise in hog receipts and a 5.4 per cent increase in dairy receipts. Cattle receipts also increased (1.4 per cent) to total \$31.8 million. Direct payments to farmers saw a decrease of 39.5 per cent.²⁶

The total farm product price index increased by 7.6 per cent in 2021, as the price index rose in every major commodity group. For crops, fruit prices saw the largest increase, at 21.2 per cent, while potato prices increased 7.4 per cent. Livestock prices also saw increases, with hog prices leading the way, rising 39.5 per cent. For more data on Agriculture, see tables 65 to 77.

Retail Trade

Retail sales on Prince Edward Island in 2021 increased for the twelfth consecutive year, with a 19.7 per cent increase. Sales were valued at \$3.0 billion. Notable increases were seen in *motor vehicle and parts dealers*, up 22.9 per cent or \$144.2 million, *building material and garden equipment* stores, up 25.0 per cent or \$78.9 million, *gasoline stations*, up 29.2 per cent or \$77.4 million, and *supermarkets*, up 7.3 per cent or \$32.3 million.²⁷ Diagram 10 shows retail sales growth since 2012.



The number of new vehicles sold on Prince Edward Island saw an increase of 446 units in 2021 to total 7,476, following a 13.4 per cent decrease in 2020. The value of new vehicles sold increased by 11.6 per cent, rising to \$294.1 million.²⁸ Employment in the wholesale/retail trade sector was 11,500, an increase of 5.5 per cent compared to 2020.²⁹ For information about the retail trade sector see Tables 49 and 50.



Fisheries

The *Department of Fisheries and Communities* estimates that the value of total fish landings in 2021 almost doubled, increasing by 92.9 per cent to \$478.5 million, following a 28.9 per cent drop in 2020. Molluscs and crustaceans remain by far the top species of the Island fishery comprising 97.6 per cent of the total value of all fish landings. Total lobster landings increased by 21.1 per cent in 2021, which along with higher prices, contributed to the total value rising by 123.2 per cent to \$370.9 million. Lobster prices increased to an average of \$7.86/lb in 2021, which was an all-time high. Diagram 11 shows the value of lobster landings on PEI from 2012 to 2021. The value of other crustaceans and molluscs increased by 46.9 per cent in 2021.



Landings of groundfish, pelagic and estuarial fish declined for the fourth consecutive year, dropping 51.1 per cent to 4.3 million pounds. Prices received by fishers increased or remained steady in 2021 for every major species. In addition to the increase for lobster, notable increases were seen in prices for snow crab (up by 64.7 per cent to \$7.00 /lb.) and mussels (up by 14.3 per cent to \$0.80/lb.). The price for oysters remained steady for the third consecutive year at \$1.60/lb. For more data on fisheries see Tables 79 to 83.

Tourism

Tourism was the industry that was most severely impacted by COVID-19, as it bore the brunt of travel restrictions, capacity limits and event cancellations. Spring and summer 2021 saw travel restrictions ease at various stages, however the number of visitors remained well below pre-pandemic levels. The total number of room nights sold at fixed roof accommodations rose by 68.0 per cent in 2021, following a decline of 63.9 per cent in 2020. Occupancy rates at Island accommodations improved to 31.5 per cent from 19.4 per cent in 2020, however still below the 45.6 per cent seen in 2019. Site nights sold at campgrounds increased 26.4 per cent, with the occupancy rate up to 39.2 per cent from 36.0 per cent in 2020.³⁰

Air travel came to a virtual halt during 2020 as COVID-19 border closures and travel restrictions were in effect for most of the year. 2021 saw a rebound in air traffic, however levels were well below normal. The total number of passengers travelling through Charlottetown Airport was up 55.7 per cent in 2021, rising from 71,410 in 2020 to 111,160 in 2021. This compares to 383,183 total passengers in 2019.³¹

Total ferry passengers³² increased by 59.1 per cent in 2021, following a decrease of 60.9 per cent in 2020.³³ Total ferry traffic remained down 37.7 per cent as compared to 2019. Annual bridge traffic increased by 4.4 per cent in 2021, following a decrease of 41.9 per cent in 2020. Although traffic increased, this was still down 39.3 per cent as compared to 2019. Visitors from the Atlantic region were permitted in June, and from the rest of Canada in July, boosting summer bridge traffic (July and August) by 29.4 per cent over the same period in 2020.³⁴ For more information on tourism, see tables 84 to 88 and table 99.


Construction, Investment and Housing

Statistics Canada estimates that total investment on Prince Edward Island valued \$826.2 million in 2021, an increase of 11.9 per cent over 2020.³⁵ Public sector investment increased from \$326.7 million in 2020 to \$381.2 million in 2021, an increase of 16.7 per cent, while private sector investment increased by 8.1 per cent, from \$411.8 million in 2020 to \$445.0 million in 2021.³⁶

Non-residential construction investment increased by 36.2 per cent in 2021, due mainly to a 55.5 per cent increase in commercial investment. Government and institutional investment more than doubled, increasing by 113.6 per cent, while industrial investment rose by 5.0 per cent.

Total residential investment increased 45.9 per cent in 2021, largely due to increased investment in single family dwellings, which grew by 71.0 per cent. Investment in multi-unit dwellings decreased by 17.1 per cent, while investment in other types of units more than doubled, rising by 120.8 per cent in 2021.³⁷

The Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) estimated that there were 1,267 new housing starts on Prince Edward Island in 2021. This is up by 27, or 2.2 per cent, from 2020. As seen in Diagram 12, the increase occurred for all types of dwellings. The largest increase was for single-detached houses, which increased from 498 starts in 2020 to 708 in 2021.³⁸

The annual vacancy rate for apartment structures of six units and over in Charlottetown fell one percentage point, from 2.5 per cent in 2020 to 1.5 per cent in 2021. The rate in Summerside fell from 1.0 per cent in 2020 to 0.7 per cent in 2021.³⁹ For more information on Housing, Investment and Construction see Tables 56 to 64.

The Public Service Sector

Statistics Canada's *Survey of Employment, Earnings and Hours* (SEPH) indicates that employment in *public administration* (federal, provincial and municipal) increased by 1.1 per cent in 2021. Employment in the *health and social services* sector rose by 1.7 per cent, while employment in the *education* sector increased by 7.3 per cent.⁴⁰

Provincial Finance

The provincial *Public Accounts*, Consolidated Statement of Operations for fiscal year 2020/21 shows that the Province of Prince Edward Island received \$2.4 billion in total revenue, 8.1 per cent higher than in FY 2019/20. Provincial own-source revenues were valued at \$1.4 billion, an increase of 4.3 per cent from a year earlier. Total federal transfers to Prince Edward Island contributed 40.9 per cent to the province's total revenue in FY 2020/21 compared to 38.8 per cent in the last fiscal year. Equalization payments increased by 8.4 per cent to value \$454.1 million, while Canada Health and Social Transfer (CHST) payments advanced 4.3 per cent to total \$241.7 million. Total expenditures rose by 9.4 per cent to reach \$2.4 billion. The Consolidated Statement of Operations shows a deficit for FY 2020/21 in the amount of \$5.7 million. As of March 31, 2021 the provincial net debt was \$2.3 billion, up 4.3 per cent from 2020. 41 More data on the government sector can be found in Tables 116 to 119.









Businesses are counted according to the number of 'statistical locations' they have. For example, a retail business with 10 stores and a head office is counted 11 times in the Canadian business counts.

The data includes all active Canadian locations with employees.

Fluctuations in these figures from one reference period to another can come from methodological changes (for example, changes to the method for identifying inactive units or in business industrial classification strategies). As a result, these data do not only represent changes in the business population over time. **Statistics Canada advises users not to use these data as a time series.**

The Unclassified category is composed of units which have not been coded to an industry.



Results of the Canadian Income Survey should not be compared to those produced by the Survey of Labour and Income Dynamics or other previous income surveys.

The low income cut-offs before tax (LICO-BT) are income thresholds below which a family will likely devote a larger share of its before-tax income on the necessities of food, shelter and clothing than the average family. The approach is essentially to estimate an income threshold at which families are expected to spend 20 percentage points more than the average family on food, shelter and clothing, based on the 1992 Family Expenditures Survey. LICOs are calculated in this manner for seven family sizes and five community sizes.

The Market Basket Measure (MBM) is based on the cost of a specific basket of goods and services representing a modest, basic standard of living. It includes the costs of food, clothing, shelter, transportation and other items for a reference family. These costs are compared to the disposable income of families to determine whether or not they fall below the poverty line.

Low income measures (LIMs), are relative measures of low income, set at 50% of adjusted median household income. These measures are categorized according to the number of persons present in the household, reflecting the economies of scale inherent in household size.

An economic family refers to a group of two or more persons who live in the same dwelling and are related to each other by blood, marriage, common-law, adoption or a foster relationship.




