The Act provides a modern legislative framework that enables cost-effective delivery of services and, through better reporting to Parliament, improves transparency and oversight.

Last year, a detailed listing of individual fees under the department's authority, along with anticipated increases, was added to the reporting requirements.



This year's report provides more detail on each fee, such as the type and rate of adjustment, the service standard and the performance result. This information provides additional context on each fee, in the spirit of open and transparent fee management.

I welcome the increased transparency and oversight that the *Service Fees Act*'s reporting regime embodies, and I am fully committed to transitioning my department to this modern framework.

About this report

This report, which is tabled under section 20 of the *Service Fees Act*ⁱⁱⁱ and section 4.2.8 of the *Directive on Charging and Special Financial Authorities*, contains information about the fees that the Department of Justice had the authority to charge in the 2018 to 2019 fiscal year.

This report contains information about all fees that are under the Department of Justice's authority, even if some or all of the fees are collected by another department.

The information reported includes fees that:

- fall under the Service Fees Act
- are exempt from the Service Fees Act

The information covers fees set by:

- contract
- market-base, auction or both
- act, regulation or fees notice

For fees set by the following mechanisms, the report provides totals only:

- contract
- market-base, auction or both

For fees set by act, regulation or fees notice, the report provides totals for fee groupings, as well as detailed information for each individual fee.

Although the fees charged by the Department of Justice under the *Access to Information Act* are subject to the *Service Fees Act*, they are not included in this report. Information on the Department of Justice's access to information fees for fiscal year 2018 to 2019 is posted on the Department of Justice Access to Information and Privacy Research and Reports web page^{iv}.

Remissions

A remission is a partial or full return of a fee to a fee payer who paid for a service for which a department deemed that the service standard was not met.

Under the *Service Fees Act*, departments must develop policies for determining whether a service standard has been met and for determining how much of a fee will be remitted to a fee payer. This requirement does not take effect until April 1, 2020. This report therefore includes **only** those remissions issued under the Department of Justice's enabling legislation. It does not include remissions issued under the *Service Fees Act*.

The following table presents the total revenue, cost and remissions for all fees that the Department of Justice had the authority to charge in fiscal year 2018 to 2019, by fee type.

^{*}Total remissions represents the amount of fees related to the Family Orders and Agreements Enforcement Assistance Act (FOAEAA) Part II that were not collected during the five-year binding period. The remissions are significant because fees can only be collected from garnishable moneys payable to the support payer after garnishment has taken place. Any fees not collected in-year can be collected in a subsequent year during the five-year binding period. Any portion of the fees not collected during the five-year binding period is remitted, that is to say the support payer no longer owes the fees.

^{**} On April 1, 2019, a new FOAEAA Part II fee structure was implemented: this change eliminates the five-year period and revises the fee to \$38 annually for processing every garnishee summonses issued against them on or after April 1, 2019; the old rules continue to apply for garnishee summons served on Her Majesty before April 1, 2019 until each of them reaches in 2019-2020 the anniversary date (day and month) they were first received. After that day, the new rules apply.
