# The Victims' Bill of Rights Registration Guidelines

Please refer to Understanding The Victims' Bill of Rights for a current list of the most serious crimes to see if you are eligible for services under The Victims' Bill of Rights.

The meaning of the words in **bold** type are also explained in Understanding The Victims' Bill of Rights. Manitoba Justice recognizes the need to offer information, assistance and support to victims of the most serious crimes.

#### Victim services workers:

- provide information about the justice system and community resources
- advise victims of their options, rights and responsibilities

#### Why should I register?

You must register with Manitoba Justice if you want to exercise your rights under *The Victims' Bill of Rights (VBR)*. The VBR is a law that gives rights to victims of the most serious crimes.

You can access these rights as you deal with police, prosecutors, the courts and corrections agencies. However, you must register with Manitoba Justice through a **victim services worker** once criminal charges have been laid.

#### How do I register?
